Standing Orders for Annual Convention

A. The Proposer of a Resolution or of an Amendment thereto may speak for 5 minutes, but no more than 5 minutes.

Convention 2020

B. A delegate speaking to a Resolution or of an Amendment must not exceed 3 minutes.

C. The Proposer of a Resolution or an Amendment may speak a second time for 3 minutes before a vote is taken, but no other delegate may speak a second time to the same Resolution or Amendment.

D. The Chairman may at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed call on the proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.

E. A delegate may, with the consent of the Chairman, move "that the question be now put", after which when the proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.

F. Where the meeting considers it appropriate, a vote may be by secret ballot.

G. A speaker to a Report or to any other general discussion shall not exceed 3 minutes to any one topic.

H. Any motion seeking additions or amendments to Rules, Regulations etc must have a majority equal to that as outlined in the Official Guide of those present, entitled to vote and voting.

I. Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter on the Agenda except by the consent of a majority equal to two thirds of those present, entitled to vote and voting.

J. The Chairman may change the order of items on the agenda with the support of a simple majority of those present, entitled to vote and voting.

When I sit down to write the Annual Report, I reflect on a year's activities for Louth GAA. It is a year that we will never forget. As we sat down in December to plan for the year ahead, little did we know what was ahead of us come March. A worldwide virus that stopped not only the GAA world but the world as a whole. I wish to offer my sincere condolences to all families and friends who have lost a loved one from Covid-19. This virus will be with us for a time to come and we all continue to work hard to live with Covid-19 and stau safe. On the field of play in 2020 will be one we will want to forget for our Senior Football Team, Relegation to Division 4 in the National Football league and going out in the Leinster Senior Football Championship at the first hurdle. Our League campaign albeit split in two with a 6 month break due to Covid-19 and then a return to play firstly with Club Competitions was not what we expected. Following on from a good campaign in 2019 we were quietly confident of maybe a return to Division 2. That was not to be and with relegation almost confirmed before the unexpected break with defeats to Longford, Leitrim, Tipperary, Offaly & Derry. When we returned on October 17th a defeat to Cork sealed our relegation to Division four. We completed our league campaign a week later with a moral boosting win over Down. Next up a week later was our round 1 game v Longford in Mullingar in the Leinster Senior Football Championship. A two-point defeat in a game where we had most of the play was disappointing and brought down the curtain for our senior footballers for 2020.

Our Senior hurlers league campaign had room for improvement but was used sufficiently to prepare the squad for the Lory Meagher cup. With a defeat at home to Fermanagh in round one of the Lory Meagher in a game we should have won in Darver it left us knowing that an away win in Cavan two weeks later would send us to Croke Park for the final. In a tight and tough contest in Breffni Park and down to 14 the boys put in a determined display and a two-point win ensured our place in the final v Fermanagh. Croke Park on November 28th a day Louth Hurling will not forget, an outstanding display from the team ensured our second Lory Meagher title. Paul McCormack has now assembled a fine squad and is continuing to build for the future.

Going forward as a County we must now plan for the future. A future that will take a lot of hard work to get Louth back where we belong. Let's be honest Louth are not a Division 4 County.





We rewind to 2010 when Louth competed in a Leinster Senior Football Final and only for poor officialdom, we would have become Leinster Champions for the first time since 1957, and who knows where that would have taken us as a County. Since 2010 we have more or less been on a downward spiral and it must stop. We are producing quality players and we have a superb training centre and are now in the process of finally building a new home in Dundalk. But on the field is where we must not ignore what is happening, I believe our senior football team should be plying our trade in at least division 2 and competing within the top 16 counties on the island and with the appointment of the great Mickey Harte as our new senior football manager and he will be assisted by the highly regarded Gavin Devlin and with a new under 20 management team of Christy Grimes, Derek Walsh, John O'Brien and Jim Farrell we hope this is the start of a new era in Louth Football. Aaron Hoey and his Management team at minor level continue to develop our young players and an excellent win in the first round of the Leinster Championship over Wexford was then halted by the Covid lockdown. A quarter final place with Kildare now awaits them. With Paul McCormack staying in charge, Our Senior hurlers have now assembled a panel that we hope will be challenging for promotion in the league in 2021.

We as a County Committee must continue to do the job we were appointed to do and that is work hard for Louth GAA. It will take a lot on time, hard work and most of all, finance to ensure our County teams develop. We must leave no stone unturned during our tenure to put the plan in place for the future of Louth GAA. I believe we have the right man in place at the top in our chairperson Peter Fitzpatrick, Peter is one of the greats of Louth GAA and all he wants is Louth to be at the top again. Peter's enthusiasm is spread through the County and I have no doubt given the time we will be at the top again under Peter's leadership. The appointment of Colin Kelly as Development squad coordinator is a major asset and already moving in the right direction with excellent appointments to the management teams of our Under 14 and Under 15 development squads. Colin's knowledge and coaching expertise will only be a plus for the future of Louth GAA.

A committee is currently in place looking into our club football structures and it is very important all clubs take time in discussing the committee's findings and ensure the right decisions are made for their future. More work must go into Club Hurling in Louth, with only three clubs competing in our Senior Hurling Championship in 2020, we need to work hard to increase club participation. Clubs need help in promoting hurling in our schools and clubs. We are committed to ensuring this happens and with the success or our senior hurlers this should encourage more children to play the game. We need to have a specific night for underage club hurling in Louth to make sure the club games are played and a proper fixture list adhered to.





A lot of hard work is been done in Coiste Iomana trying to get their fixtures played and a specific night should help get the games played during summer months.

We have an excellent team in our Coaching and Games department led by another one of Louth's finest in Shane Lennon. Shane and his team spend many hours coaching in our schools and clubs, and are improving the standards of Gaelic games at juvenile level. This coaching will have a huge benefit to all schools and clubs when the work is put in. I ask all clubs to please support our coaching and games team with the work they are doing in the schools. They must be commended for the work they done when ensuring the Cul camps went ahead this year during very difficult circumstances. The work that is going on in our clubs is excellent. When you look around the County, all our club facilities are second to none and this is down to the volunteers who give all their spare time to their clubs. Without the volunteer there is no club and without the club there is no Louth GAA. We must continue to support our clubs in every way we can. I would like to thank our outgoing Senior Football and Under 20 Football Management teams led by Wayne Kierans and Aidan Shevlin for all their hard work and dedication throughout the year. I would like to take this opportunity to wish all our Management Teams and Players the very best for the year ahead. At Club level I would like to Thank all Club Secretaries and Club Officers for their help and co-operation throughout the year. In a difficult year, you have worked very hard for your club.

To my fellow Officers at County Board level, thank you and here is to a great 2021. A special word of thanks to Declan Byrne who we lose from the county board this year due to the 5-year ruleCCC: I want to congratulate the CCC on an early completion of their programme of fixtures for 2020. unfortunately, due the COVID-19 19 restrictions all their good work was quickly undone but they persevered and continued to bring us an updated fixture schedule in line with the latest government and GAA regulations. We completed a full championship programme but were unable to complete our leagues. Due to the COVID-19 19 restrictions were also unable to schedule our Junior Championship or U20 competitions. Best put, Sunday's victory in Navan wasn't bad for starters. Inexperienced and untried at inter-county level, half of Louth's 20 players used were on debut at Páirc Tailteann and, so, a victory was both surprising and pleasant. A quarter of the men Wayne Kierans put faith in have come through the minor teams he managed, while only eight have tasted senior championship football for the county in the past.So, it will come as little surprise that those who spearheaded this triumph were regulars, Tommy Durnin delivering a commanding midfield performance as Sam Mulroy led the attack, accounting for the majority of Louth's total. Still, though, it makes one smile at the negativity pinned on Kierans' second season in charge when you consider how accomplished a number of the newcomers were in contrast to their fledgling colleagues on the Meath selection.Dundalk Gaels' Oisín Murray looked physically at home in The Reds' backline, showing shrewdness in possession while never being found displaced defensively. On one particular occasion during the second half he cut out a ball which was destined to fall into a Meath attacker's hands a matter of metres from goal.Likewise, Liam Jackson (Ardee St. Mary's), a young player of whom much is expected, was diligent and scored a fine point in one of his regular raids forward. Glen Emmets' AndrewMooney was hugely effective as Louth repeatedly exploited the Meath backline with overlapping moves, while Cathal Bellew figured solidly at the heart of Louth's defence. The latter's ability in that vital position, and with Dermot Campbell a viable option there too, may even free up captain Bevan Duffy to move into a more advanced station when he comes back into the equation, Kierans admits.Duffy, of course, was missing on Sunday, his partner having given birth in recent days. For a man who forever delivers on the pitch, last weekend saw him fittingly perform off it. But, in his place, Durnin played a leader's role."He got through an unbelievable amount of work all over the pitch,"





Kierans said of the Westerns powerhouse."Tommy was the captain today, he's one of the leaders in our team, so you'd always expect it from him, but fair play to him, he pretty much always delivers in a red shirt."

DUAL STAR

The forward unit was effective, with Mulroy, as his contribution would suggest, the pick of the starting bunch. But, in after eight minutes to replace the injured Conor Grimes, Paul Matthews' role cannot be underestimated. A hurler with The Wee County, too, the rangy St. Fechin's man added a touch of class and creativity to Louth's second half play into the hospital end. He chipped in with a point to finish the game's most outstanding team move, after 52 minutes, a register which pushed the visitors four points in front. Given the sparsity of scores, it was a gap that never looked like being reeled in. If he remains committed and injury refrains itself from striking, provided an arrangement can be accommodated between the hurlers and footballers, Matthews could play a big part for Kierans and co moving forward. He certainly has the talent, while anybody familiar with Matthews - whose father, Paddy, previously togged out for The Reds - will know he doesn't lack in the temperament stakes either. JOB DONE

Kierans' pre-match brief demanded a "workmanlike" display, and he certainly wasn't disappointed, despite his team's tentative opening. Trailing thrice over the course of the first 20 minutes, Louth didn't take control until Mulroy converted shortly before the halfhour. A powerful flurry had Louth retiring with a two-point advantage - 0-6 to four - only for Meath to capitalise on another Wee County slumber to take the lead again amid a third quarter revival.But, after tying matters, a Durnin burst was cynically upended, yielding the penalty which Mulroy ruthlessly dispatched beneath Dominic Yorke. And when Matthews pointed to make it 1-8 to 0-7, the outcome was known, if not the result."A collective performance is really what we were after; that was the objective. We were looking for a workmanlike, intense performance. That was the basis and we got that, and the win was a bonus."I thought our composure during the second half, where Meath were always going to come on strongly, was quite good. There is lots we have to work on in terms of trying to finish the game stronger and get more attacks in against the wind, but I'm really happy with the performance of the boys."For a lot of lads to get 70 minutes under their belt is a massive bonus."The new rules were also making their bow, three of Meath's points having been as a consequence of attacking marks. Another of the directives, the sin bin, was also put into usefollowing a late shemozzle, Matthews seeing a black card for his part. Louth 1-10 Offaly 1-16

Drogheda has become an increasingly barren hunting ground for Louth and another defeat was added to the list at the weekend as Offaly departed The Gaelic Grounds with the spoils comfortably tucked away. Saturday's six-point loss was The Wee County's ninth defeat from 11 fixtures at the North Road venue, a period covering four seasons and three managers. The only victory during the spell in question came in the 2019 National League against Sligo, while a subsequent draw with Westmeath wasn't enough to propel The Reds to promotion last April. The latter are the next visitors to Louth in the new year, where a place in the semi-finals of the O'Byrne Cup will potentially be up for grabs, ahead of a tricky looking league campaign that includes four home outings. It's clear that if the dour Drogheda pattern continues Wayne Kierans will have his work cut out to keep his side from hovering above the drop door. Offaly are one of the sides set to visit the O'Raghallaigh's amid the upcoming programme. Indeed, The Faithful are an opponent who Louth will be targeting for the points required to consolidate, before thoughts of a top-two spot can come into focus.But while Saturday's reverse was disappointing, especially on the back of the victory in Navan six days previously, it's not worth reading into the result too much. Offaly have clearly enjoyed a productive winter of conditioning and always looked the part in brutally cold conditions. Louth, on the other hand, were poor, but they will undoubtedly improve, with experienced men like Bevan Duffy, James Califf, Conor Grimes and Ryan Burns among those set to return.





The newcomers will continue to grow in stature, too, Seán Murray having become the 10th debutant in consecutive outings on Saturday, while the strong displays of Liam Jackson and Andrew Mooney, for the second matches running, bodes well.

PLAYING CATCH-UP

Ultimately, grumbling about the Louth performance would be futile, particularly when only pre-season silverware is at stake, but it certainly was multiple levels down on the Meath exercise. There was a crispness lacking and the play was too often of a lateral flavour as Offaly's defence repelled several attacks quite easily. John Maughan's charges, meanwhile, penetrated far more effectively and had it not been for some wayward shooting into the breeze during the opening half, would have departed with a deserved half-time advantage. As it transpired, in spite of having just two first half scorers, with four of Declan Byrne's five points coming from frees, Louth retired level at 0-6 each. Ciarán Downey offered an evident bit of quality when introduced for the injured Tommy Durnin and the Newtown Blues man kicked the fifth of The Reds' points. Buoyed by their late rally, a Downey register had Louth in front for the first and only time within a minute of the second half getting underway. But the dawn was false and by the time the home outfit next got on target, when Sam Mulroy's persistence resulted in a goal, The Wee County were well adrift, the winners having shot 1-5 to no-reply, Anton Sullivan's rasping drive bolting past Craig Lynch not long into the second half.Now five in arrears, one floated with the idea of a tight finish. Yet Offaly surged clear with the impressive Cian Farrell scoring 0-3 after coming in off the line.'Newbridge or Nowhere,' we heard. More like 'Anywhere but Drogheda'.

Louth 0-11 Westmeath 1-13 The last time Ciarán Byrne played for Louth: Dublin hadn't got hold of Sam Maguire, Manchester United were champions of England and Ireland were yet to defeat the All Blacks.

Six-and-a-half years on, quite a bit has changed, if not the heft of the Drogheda surface, the 25-year-old joked after the match. He had just made his 10th appearance for The Reds and first since starring in a losing cause, against Kildare in 2013. On that occasion, he famously caught hold of a stray dog that had broken curfew in roaming freely towards the bottom end of St. Conleth's Park, giving it a cuddle before raising it to the crowd's amusement and offering it to a steward. He was a handful himself that night, scoring five points from play, as the Kildare defenders contained neither him nor the mutt.

And so, his return to the fray during Saturday afternoon's O'Byrne Cup clash with Westmeath was a sight for sore eyes. In the 17 months since his homecoming, the raging talent has played just seven competitive matches. Ultimately, losing the weekend's fixture was lodged in the irrelevant category given Byrne's return.

Though, having been cursed by various injuries, the most recent of which was hamstring related, there were question marks over his sense of attire. Sporting a pair of white boots, in typical winter conditions, and a sock choice of old, he was certainly distinctive during his stint in play.

"It's a bit questionable," the St. Mochta's man said of his colour of footwear. "They're probably a summer boot, but ever since I've gone to Australia, I've had white boots so I kind of continued the trend here. I might as well stick with it," he quipped.

His introduction came at the cost of clubmate Gerry Garland and saw him stationed alongside brother Declan in the full-forward line, as the siblings featured together for the first time in a Louth jersey, adding further weight to a seminal occasion.

"As soon as I went on, I was standing beside him, so that's a proud moment," 'Casey' added."Playing with your brother with your club is a massive thing, but playing with your brother with the county is even bigger. Hopefully, there's plenty more of those games to come."





SPRING TARGET

Louth play London next weekend in a challenge match that will likely see the Mochta's man get further minutes under his belt, which is ultimately what he's bidding for ahead of the opening National League fixture at the end of the month.But he's not exclusive to that club, with Gerard McSorley, Ryan Burns, Conor Grimes, James Craven and Andrew Mooney all set to use the upcoming weeks to improve their states in time for the trip to Longford on January 26. I only played 20 minutes there, I need a lot more game-time to get myself back up to the swing of things," said Byrne. Simple things like getting used to the ball - I was a bit fumbley - that will take its time and hopefully I'll get a couple of challenge matches before the first game and be flying.

"It's so frustrating when you see Grimsey, Burnsey and those other boys still injured. If we can get them all back on track over the next couple of weeks there's no reason why we can't push on and compete in Division Three."

HIGHLIGHTLouth's other highlight of a pretty disappointing display was the performance of Declan Byrne, the elder of the pair kicking five points, including three advanced marks having shown and held possession inside. Arguably no other forward at Wayne Kierans' disposal has his ball-winning and scoring abilities in tandem and so his availability over the months to come may prove vital. His opener, a mark, drew the teams level at 0-3 apiece, after which Louth took control, moving six points to four in front over a spell in which Westmeath were held at bay for 12 minutes.But as carelessness crept into their game, Louth began to offer the away team cheaply-earned possession and were punished ruthlessly in the 28th minute when a move stemming from a giveaway saw Conor McCormack transfer to John Heslin who laid off for Ronan Wallace to find the net. So crucial was the goal in a game of fine margins that it split the sides on five separate second half occasions, with Louth failing to get any closer than two points.Victory would have set-up a semi-final encounter with Offaly in Tullamore. Instead, though, The Reds will have to make do with hosting The Exiles, which is the chief disappointment on the day the boy wonder stepped back into the fold.

Division Three isn't conducive to slow starting teams and with Louth yet to escape their block, Wayne Kierans' team are already lagging behind in a league where they're one of just two sides still to get off the mark.Sunday's defeat by Longford was miserable, as The Reds failed to raise any sort of challenge. The hosts were by no means impressive, but had far too much guile and craft for disappointing Louth.The sides' entire outlook was in contrast. Longford's play was far more effective and direct in the sense that Dessie Reynolds and Rian Brady were omnipresent outlets, and a lion's share of the winners' scores involved the lively pair.Louth, on the other hand, laboured over and back the field, employing a style which must have had Ryan Burns and Declan Byrne, in the inside line, gritting their teeth in frustration.Even when chasing the affair, amid the closing 10 minutes, substitute Conor Grimes raced towards the corner flag to gather possession, passing out to Oisín Murray, who in turn kicked to a static team-mate in the centre of the field. In two passes, The Reds had retreated 60 metres or more.

It's a lethargic way of playing that simply will not breach defences often enough to lift Louth away from trouble in a viciously competitive league, one much stronger than the tier the visitors went close to securing promotion from 12 months ago.





Kierans accepted his outfit were pedestrian in phases of play, although he made the point that supply channels to the danger zone aren't always available.

Byrne was a hugely effective option in the recent O'Byrne Cup defeat by Westmeath, showing from the square and calling - before scoring from - marks aplenty. This ploy was starkly non-existent in the midlands, though.

"Those little passing channels aren't there," Kierans told The Democrat, in response. "There were a couple of guys in front of him and the movement has to be very sweet; a different type of movement than just direct little pop balls.

"There's other areas of the game I was disappointed with. Every free-kick we had, where we'd a couple of seconds to make a decision, every single one went in a negative angle, which is something we'll look at. That can be improved without moving it through the lines.

"It was our set-plays I was disappointed with. We should be trying to penetrate and go that bit longer. There is a balance with patience, but we scored a goal in the first half with patience football. We coughed up a lot of attacks when we weren't patient.

"It's not to everybody's liking, but in the possession-based game it's very important to get it right. At this level you can't be coughing up the ball."

ROOKIES RAMPAGED

For Louth to have been in a competitive position entering the dying embers was a minor miracle, given the run-around the team's youthful backline got during the first half. Twice Craig Lynch had to pull off acrobatic stops at a time where The Wee County were in a spin field-over.Burns began the game sprightly and knocked over a nice point, having converted from a narrow-angled free shortly beforehand, but he was feeding off scraps as Longford, with Darren Gallagher and Kevin Diffley dominating the midfield exchanges, couriered the ball into a crew of dangerous attackers. The gap was six, 0-8 to two, and ought to have been more when a slick Louth passing sequence split the home rear-guard for the first and only meaningful time. Byrne slipped in Conall McKeever, who retired injured not long after, and the Clan na Gael man squared for league debutant Gerry Garland to palm into a gaping goal.It was a kick less major, however, as Louth continued to waltz through the motions, allowing Reynolds however much space he required to land a Longford reply within 30 seconds. Whatever you can do I can do better being the theme.





Despite trailing by just three at the interval, 0-9 to 1-3, there was no way back, even though there was a second half improvement.

"I didn't think we really got going," Kierans surmised. "We got a really good goal in the first half and didn't really kick on from that; I thought they got a lot of scores really cheaply.

"We did better in the second half - it was seven points all in the second half - but we just couldn't get any way closer than three points. We needed a goal that never really looked like coming."

True, another major, the one required, was never going to come, even when the playing number was reduced to 14 apiece, after second yellows for Eoghan Callaghan (Louth) and Michael Quinn (Longford).

Captain Bevan Duffy and brother Eoghan were at the heart of Louth's late surge, while another reserve, Paul Mathews, kicked a point. But the exercise always held a forlorn look. Longford were just playing out time, Louth too.

Louth 1-7 Tipperary 0-11

It was the type of crushing defeat that suggests Louth possess a one-way ticket to Division Four. A second successive reverse, relegation was the outcome of the last league campaign that began as such, in 2018.

Lady luck seemed to be favouring Wayne Kierans' men on Sunday, Tommy Durnin's looping goal three minutes into the second half bridging the advantage to six points. In spite of facing a stiff breeze blowing towards the hospital end, Louth, it appeared, had too much for sluggish Tipperary.

But a return of just two points over the remainder of the contest, both Sam Mulroy frees, left the door ajar for the Munster men to launch a momentum-supported push amid the closing quarter, Brian Fox's injury-time winner icing a run of five consecutive points from the 56th minute onwards.

It was a knockout blow to an already wounded Louth side that continues to bleed players. Ryan Burns and Declan Byrne were both ruled out of the Gaelic Grounds clash through injury, bringing the tally of outfielders currently unavailable due to hamstring trouble to six - Conall McKeever, Ciarán Byrne, James Craven and Niall Sharkey being the outstanding quartet.

Yet it would be naive to blame absenteeism for Sunday's "heartbreak", as Kierans referred to it. There really can be no excuses as Tipp were there for the taking and Louth, in fact, had 'taken them', only to allow David Power's charges to roam from captivity.

The game-costing slump coincided with the premature substitutions of Liam Jackson and Paul Mathews, while those introduced by Tipperary had an influential impact on proceedings, Alan Moloney especially. Tipp's No22 kicked two outside-of-the-left points fit to grace Croke Park, registers which had a rousing effect on the winners.

Louth, meanwhile, coughed up possession on a repeated scale and while the gust grew, Jackson and Mathews were making light of the conditions with powerful, surging runs before their calling ashore. Thereafter, the purpose went out of The Reds' play and Tipp, with Fox and Jack Kennedy outstanding, rammed a dagger through Louth's faltering challenge.



DISASTER

The consequences of the weekend's result are colossal, too, given this year's altered format. Not only, via the Tipp defeat, have Louth's promotion hopes dispersed, with a demotion scrap veering into clear sight, there is now an inevitability that the county will be condemned to the first running of the meaningless B Championship, with the Leinster final place required, should league promotion not materialise, looking far beyond reach.

While round one losses aren't catastrophic, back-to-back failures are virtually impossible to recover from in a telling sense, with the standings beginning to take shape from the current juncture. Midway through the second half on Sunday, Louth were primed to bound towards mid-table, Tipperary, Leitrim, Offaly and Derry each pivoted beneath. But, in the aftermath of a collapse, The Reds are now the only pointless competitor of Division Three's eight.

Kierans touched upon his team's first half wides' tally of seven after the game and while he was content with holding a three-point lead at the interval, it ought to have been more on account of the conditions. And then there was Tipp's incredible draught, entailing all of 32 minutes from when Conor Sweeney established their early two-point lead.

When the tide subsequently turned, Mulroy (3), Emmet Carolan and Durnin efforts were successful, but a killer goal chance was never burgeoned until the latter's wobbling shot pipped the grasp of Evan Comerford, shortly after half-time.

At that stage, had this been a boxing contest, the referee would have been tempted to call a halt with one performer – Tipp, in this case – being hauled around like a ragdoll. But Louth relented in their physical pummelling, allowing opponents other than Fox, the man of the match, to punch in reply.

A side-line conversion from Sweeney was the standout finish among four consecutive points which reduced the deficit to two, 1-5 to six. Though Louth kept a lid on Tipp's head of steam via Mulroy's brace, only for the pressure to mount to uncontainable levels, with the hosts' most established stars failing in their bid to halt the demise.

Moloney's wonderful couple accompanied Sweeney and Kevin Fahey strikes before Fox cut inside in stoppage time to cap a highly unlikely revival, leaving Louth mystified as to the reason for their implosion.

"We couldn't get the couple of scores in the last quarter of the game to keep us right," Kierans added

"They finished very strongly and every time we did break away, we just couldn't connect with the forwards. We were giving it back cheaply to them and they were kicking nice points."

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Louth's season is in a perilous state. Defeat to Offaly is imponderable.

Offaly's players are well-used to bogs and so they put their greater nous of the conditions into practice by winning Sunday's relegation four-pointer in mucky Drogheda. Albeit a whirlwind surge during the second half saw Louth reduce their deficit from 12 points to the minimum, The Faithful were worthy winners of a game which only truly became a contest upon Declan Byrne's introduction. The St. Mochta's clubman kicked two points in quick succession shortly after entering the fray, letting go a rallying cry following his latter effort. And his team-mates responded with a wonderful sequence of interchanges between Sam Mulroy and the excellent Paul Mathews resulting in the former rocketing a shot to the back of the net. A subsequent run of seven points to only a solitary reply had the gust in the hosts' sail amid the closing stages, when a rained delivery found Byrne, whose nimble feet, incredible vision and slick execution set-up the inrushing Conor Grimes to bundle the ball across the line.All of a sudden there was belief in the air, a sense of Deja vu in The Reds' favour two weeks after the late implosion against Tipperary. Winless and pointless after three matches, two of which they hosted, is a depressing record and points only in the direction of the dreaded drop. And what's more, self-harm is fast becoming an unwanted trait of this Louth team, with every mistake, it appears, being punished ruthlessly.

"If any team gives the ball away in any division at this level you're asking for trouble," manager Wayne Kierans admitted. "You might get away with it at club level.

"It's an issue and we've spoken about the stats and how many possessions we lost against Tipperary. Today, there were a couple that we gave away as well and you're just handing the opposition easy scores."

Two goals, in fact, with John Clutterbuck and Bevan Duffy, who was hauled off after 23 minutes, the guilty concedes of balls which, via Anton Sullivan and Ruairi McNamee, found their way past Craig Lynch.

"When we did come out in the second half, we missed three chances and they would have given us the momentum much earlier in the half," Kierans added.

"We kept sayng at half-time that we've 40 minutes to turn this around and we got back to a point, with some good, considered play and well-worked goals, but we made bad decisions; it's that 'composure' word again."

OVER BEFORE IT STARTED Eighteen minutes it took for The Wee County to get off the mark, by which time lethal Offaly had struck 2-4 as the home defenders failed to catch even a glimpse of their men's shadows.

Liam Jackson and Duffy points at least gave Louth a launchpad, but three of the opening period's final four registers went the way of John Maughan's Midlander's. Ultimately, attempting to overturn a 2-7 to 0-3 interval deficit, in spite of the favouring gale blowing towards the hospital end after half-time, was comparable to asking a 10-tonne Tessie to run a marathon.... In record time after the visitors grew the gap to 12 shortly after play got back underway. The game was gone in the eyes of many. Yet Kierans didn't think so, and he was almost correct."It wasn't in those conditions, because I saw it last year when we were down against Offaly and turned it around, I think we were eight down at half-time then. "Twelve down is not the position you want to be in, but all it needed was the goals and we got two, and were very unlucky not to get another one, their 'keeper made some brilliant saves. "It's always able to be turned around and the work to get it back to a point was excellent. We were disappointed about the goals we conceded in the first half. Whatever about them clipping over the points, the goals we conceded are something that we'd look back on; they were poor.





"Credit to the boys in the second half, I honestly thought when we had them down to a point that we could get something out of the game, but, unfortunately, then we made a few bad decisions. Overall, we just didn't do enough."

BYRNE BLITZ Nine was the difference when Byrne took Louth by the collar and began to hurdle whatever Offaly could hurl their way. He was making aimless hoofs in his direction look like ideal deliveries and with the gap shaved to six, Mulroy and Eoghan Callaghan tapped over before Byrne added his fourth point in less than 20 minutes.

But his moment of magic was still to arrive and after he supplied a stumbling Grimes with the chance to rekindle a faltering survival bid, the odds collapsed on a famous Louth victory.

"Deckie has the scoring power, so it was always the plan to get him on in the second half with the wind."

It wasn't to be, though. A statement which is becoming more recurrent with every passing week. The Reds are wedged in a sling hanging on the edge.

Derry 2-10 Louth 1-9

The defeat which all but resigns Louth to Division Four, it's hard to put any other twist on Sunday's loss at Celtic Park.

A game The Reds could, and perhaps should, have won slipped their grasp, leaving each and every travelling stakeholder to digest stomach-churning regret on the way home. The round one no-show against Longford, implosion at home to Tipperary and disastrous first half versus Offaly have all cost Wayne Kierans' men precious points, but there was something stinging about this Foyleside foray.

A scoreless half-hour run in the second half was incredible given Louth's territorial dominance and possession monopoly, with Derry accustomed to sitting back and inviting wave after wave of attack.

Though penetration was, again, lacking for The Wee County, as they continually whizzed the ball around the fringes of the scoring zone, over and back until boredom set-in and an adventurous play, which would damagingly end in a turnover, was attempted.

Furthermore, confidence is clearly suffering with several players struggling at times to perform the basics, thus handing away the initiative. How else could the men in red feel, this being their sixth consecutive loss and at just four points, highest league defeat of the season?

The campaign has hallmarks of the pointless run of 2018, in which demotion from Division Two was a formality. Louth have three games in which to avoid a repeat of the miserable record set by Pete McGrath's side of two seasons back, a 100 percent losing sequence, and, somewhat encouragingly, the panel appears content to stick together. "I can't really say there's a flatness," Kierans told The Democrat. "It's a good dressing room with no toxic element.

"We keep saying – and the players keep saying – we're going to stick together. It's a difficult period and an experience that will test us all, but the dressing room is fine. "If there was no work-rate or an aptitude to work hard in training or games we'd be worried. But our numbers are going up in terms of our stats, fitness work, running work and intensity.

"We're getting what was an 'unhealthy' squad fit – even though we lost a few last week, Paul Mathews, sick; Emmet Carolan, injury; Sam Mulroy, suspension; Liam Jackson, concussion protocol. We haven't had much luck."





SLACK START Although fortune actually favoured brave Louth during a fairly entertaining opening half, which Derry edged 1-6 to 1-5.

Rather, it was poor play on the visitors' part that gifted Rory Gallagher's charges a perfect start, the Ulster men rattling in 1-4 over the first eight minutes, to which only Declan Byrne responded.

The St. Mochta's long-server, who was fabulous when introduced against Offaly, was sharp with the breeze blowing in his favour and the No14 landed two frees from beyond the 50m line as Louth steadied following the costly wobble.

Ryan Burns, Byrne's sharp inside companion, struck twice in between, leaving just Shane McGuigan's goal in the difference when dogged chasing returned an energy-boosting major. Byrne had the simple task of sliding into the empty net as Derry rued their lax defensive display.

But after a bright beginning, the second quarter was miserable, showing just three points, two of which, via McGuigan, handed The Oak Leafers their interval lead.

"The fact that we gave them the 1-3 or 1-4 start made it really difficult," Kierans said. "After the initial period where we conceded, we did well and showed patience in our play. We got lucky with a goal and created some good chances in difficult situations. Going in a point down at half-time was okay."In fact, it appeared to be a fairly decent postage when Louth emerged for the restart firing, a Burns brace earning the lead for the first time on 40 minutes.But thereafter an all-too-familiar tale unfolded, skirting around the edges without having the capacity to plough through the layers of Derry defence. This, to accompany a litany of individual errors, wasn't conducive to a surprise triumph. With every breakdown, the visibility of Louth perplexion became increasingly acute.And Derry secured the spoils through Niall Loughlin's goal in the 70th minute."I thought we'd given ourselves a platform to get something out of it, but it's very difficult to break them down and when they got a point ahead, we were chasing, and conceded a poor goal at the end which killed it.

"We had some good moves, getting through them; we're nearly getting it right and as I've said to the boys, we're so near, but yet so far away."They would have been seen as the most difficult to break through, against that sort of team, but we're simply not creating enough goal chances, although it was very difficult to do that today and you can't underestimate that when they've got so many physically imposing guys back there."I think we only scored four points in the second half, we just weren't up to breaking them down as we'd hoped, but you saw how cynical they were, body-checking people, getting lads slowed down."





DAMAGE LIMITATION With Louth's fate now evermore sealed, perhaps the outlook ought to be on damage limitation ahead of the championship. It would be a hammer blow if the campaign were to end with The Reds rooted to the foot of the table.

It is evident that the players are trying, but belief has ebbed to a pulp in cases, while others are simply not good enough to reach the standard required: the blunt reality.

The crowd was dreadful at the Bogside venue, especially the travelling contingency which will have numbered no more than 50. These are concerning times for Louth GAA, but it's wickedly unfair to lump the blame for a dreadful run of results exclusively at the feet of Kierans or his management.

It was a long trek home from North Ulster. No doubt there was deep contemplation over what had gone before, on the team bus, in the heads of County Board officials and certainly among the committed few who pointed their cars in Derry's direction on Sunday morning.

As Kierans said, this is "an experience that will test us all".

Louth 1-12 Leitrim 3-14

Wayne Kierans called it precisely when saying Louth's performance "wasn't good enough" in Sunday's defeat by Leitrim. That's a mild, quite favourable description actually. The present situation can't be easy for anybody involved, yet up until now there has at least been a graft and honesty about the effort, as the slim margins – three, one, three and four points – of the opening four defeats would suggest.

But the attitude was concerningly careless at Dowdallshill and so followed a litany of basic errors, from dropping balls in the tackle, to mishandling, to kicking possession away aimlessly, to downright unforgivable passages of play. Louth were simply never going to win this game as they hadn't the mindset to.

And, quite frankly, they'll suffer nothing but defeat until leaders step forward and a bit of organisation supplements their dedication. For far too long Louth teams have been prone to rolling over.

They aren't the first county to be in disarray. Meath was hardly a bed of roses under Seamus McEnaney in 2012, the season in which Louth relegated them from Division Two. However, the team's resolve remained strong enough to reach that summer's Leinster final.It's just no longer unfair to claim that many of the current players look away when stern questions are posed. A club team wouldn't give up as easily as Louth.Kierans conceded his charges are currently "nowhere near" the level which will be required to make a fist of the Longford assignment in the championship. And approaching that fixture with nothing but L-inscribed red boxes under their form column is hardly conducive to a positive May display. What's more, The Reds face the promotion favourites, Cork and Down, in succession, meaning a pointless league campaign for the second season in three is staring them square in the face. Confidence is shattered on both sides of the white line, but there appears to be an element of the decline which is structural. Looking at the set-up from afar, it's been striking that after every game the opposition's uncalled-upon reserves have been out running on the pitch. Leitrim's goalkeeper, Diarmuid McKiernan, spent almost 20 post-match minutes ducking and diving as members of the management pounded footballs his way. Yet after all five matches so far, Louth, as a collective, have walked straight into the dressing room, substitutes going home without breaking so much as a sweat. It must then be remembered that six different players have suffered from hamstring trouble during the National League programme





LED JUST ONCE The hosts led just once over the course of the affair, when Ryan Burns and Declan Byrne pointed in response to Donal Wrynn's opener, despite playing with a galeforce breeze to their backs during their first half spent attacking the clubhouse side of St. Brigid's Park.

The tide ultimately turned on a slack defensive spell which allowed the outstanding Ryan O'Rourke to rifle past Fergal Sheekey. The Reds were simply all over the place, turning over possession and leaving full-back Dermot Campbell isolated - the Dreadnots man may as well have been fighting off the Irish Sea with a grape all afternoon.

Louth were amid a 13-minute scoreless period as O'Rourke and Keith Beirne grew the gap to four, prior to Ciarán Downey's sole register of the outing from along the right wing, which at least gave the locals something to shout about. But the concession rate remained high given the conditions, Leitrim getting to 1-5 as Louth sat on four points shortly before half-time, at which stage Burns and Tommy Durnin frees had Kierans' crew to within a pair."We're certainly not scoring enough," the Louth manager said in relation to his side's finishing."Defensively, we weren't at the races at all. Our one-vs-ones, the whole defensive system was poor which allowed them a lot of chances and luckily enough they didn't take them. Going forward, I think we kicked eight wides in the first half, which is not good either."Despite it being relatively average-to-poor in the first half, I still thought we could up it in the second half against the wind. We did create a couple of goal chances, but going the other way Leitrim didn't really have to work for their chances at all, which is of real concern."A perfect summation. Burns' third point whittled the deficit back to the minimum on the restart and moments later a hopeful lob saw the Hunterstown Rover beat McKiernan to a punch, only for Fergal McTague to claw the ball off the line, seemingly deflating Louth's challenge.

The next time The Wee County scored, some 18 minutes later, Leitrim had bagged 3-8, Beirne's penalty arriving in advance of O'Rourke's second major of the match. And worse was to come in spite of Burns' spot-kick conversion before the hour-mark."It reminds me a little bit of Antrim (qualifier) last year, which is the first time I could say that we didn't finish the game with any fight at all," Kierans added."Against Derry last week we finished reasonably strongly, so today is worrying and something we definitely have to talk about during the week. Our kick-outs went and our defensive play was poor in the last 10 minutes."Liam Jackson and Ciarán Byrne livened Louth's offence, but Leitrim, in Darragh Rooney, Beirne and O'Rourke, had clinical marksmen who helped the Connacht county fire five of the match's final eight points."It was nowhere near good enough."Relegation confirmed.

Allianz NFL Division Three – Round 6 Cork 5-19 Louth 0-16

The unfortunate reality was that Louth were visiting Páirc Uí Chaoimh on Saturday evening as a cohort of condemned men. The outcome was inevitable: a heavy defeat which confirmed a sixth successive National League defeat and relegation to Division Four. This was also the team's 10th reverse in the last 11 competitive games, stretching back to last year's championship pummelling by Dublin, and with promotion-chasing Down and in-better-fettle Longford to come before the festive season, an entire calendar span minus a victory is now a distinct possibility.

Louth's prior encounter had resulted in a double-digit loss to Leitrim last spring, a shambles which was undoubtedly the lowest point of manager Wayne Kierans' two-campaign reign. Therefore, it must be asked if, given the lengthy, Covid-enforced lay-off, the O'Connell's man would have been better to step aside considering all the signs suggest his term will not be extended beyond the conclusion of the championship?





In both Carlow and Wexford, team bosses, Turlough O'Brien and Paul Galvin, stood down over the summer on the basis that their tenures would likely have been up at that juncture under normal circumstances. Hence, their moves gave their respective successors an opportunity to evaluate what they had ahead of schedule. Whether this will stand to the south-eastern counties into the new year remains to be seen.

But it could hardly damage whatever prospects they have of a positive 2021. So, accordingly, what has been or could possibly be gained from leaving the arrangement as per the opening five rounds of the Allianz League?

Kierans, a gentleman who has done quite a bit for Louth GAA since taking over as minor supremo for 2016, deserves to be remembered for his relative achievements, his guidance of the Reds' U18 side to a first provincial final in 46 years (1971-2017) chief among them. Instead, however, it's the dismalness of a programme of drubbings that will decisively tarnish his record and dilute, in mind anyway, his policy of lowering the age profile within the panel.

And if results aren't indicative of the full tale, the absence of Declan Byrne, Ciarán Byrne and Ciarán Downey from the squad since training resumed is representative of a deeper issue. What value is there in devoting a life to Louth's cause?

Add the trio's absence to that of Jim McEneaney, Derek Maguire and Andy McDonnell and the Wee County's assembly is deprived of some necessary quality.

Eoghan Callaghan, James Califf and Conor Grimes also sat out Saturday's clash.

LEESIDE LEAKAGE

Indeed, Louth only escaped a more severe annihilation courtesy of Cork's several relaxed patches, during which the game lacked any sort of intensity. Having shot over the affair's opening two points, from Sam Mulroy – who was, again, the Leinster line-up's best man, and the returning Anthony Williams inside jig time, the Reds went scoreless for 21 minutes, until Tommy Durnin converted, momentarily reducing the shortfall to 3-6 to 0-3. The hosts' match-winning spell had yielded goals via Colm O'Callaghan, Ian Maguire and pacey Paul Kerrigan, with Killian O'Hanlon and Paul Walsh among the minor registrars. Mulroy, the key to Naomh Máirtín's recent senior championship triumph, was blemishless from placed kicks, splitting the posts 11 times in all from both hand and off the deck, and it was his accuracy which moved Louth to eight first half points; notwithstanding Cork's dominance as Ronan McCarthy's troops were a dozen-less-two ahead at the interval





And a blazing rampage on the resumption completely killed the contest, O'Hanlon, Damien Gore and Kerrigan (goal) putting the Munster competitors 4–11 to 0–8 clear. Mulroy continued to carry the Louth fight and included in his batch of points was a beauty from along the left-hand touchline. But, not to be outdone in the cameo stakes, Mark Collins came in from the bench to fire 1–5 for the Rebels as the gap grew to some 17 points in advance of a Wee rally, when Cork had lost interest, that cut it by three.

DREADFUL DISCIPLINE

That number, three, was also the tally of players Louth had dismissed. After Fergal Donohoe and Patrick Reilly had been ordered off on second yellow cards, calls which were arguably harsh, Emmet Carolan got a straight red for foul play, collapsing knees first on to an opponent.

Frustration or indiscipline, it's unaccecptable. Louth have now had six red cards in as many games and five in the last two. And bear in mind, stretching back to Colin Kelly's period in charge, this type of wayward streak where the rules are concerned has been apparent for quite some time. While the particular stats are not to hand, the issue has been recurrent.

The Reds have also conceded 12-81 in six league fixtures, by far the highest across each of the divisions.

Louth 3-14 Down 0-16

Louth saved their best display of an otherwise dour National League campaign to last as they consigned a promoted, if desperately poor, Down to defeat at St. Brigid's Park on Sunday afternoon.

Indeed, it was a Wee County performance that will inspire confidence through the panel as they approach this weekend's Leinster Championship encounter against Longford; the additions of Conor Whelan, Dermot Campbell, Eoghan Callaghan and Ciarán Keenan to the starting XV inputted an energy and sense of purpose to the line-up which were the key to a much-needed outcome.

Manager Wayne Kierans may even have stumbled across his neatest blend of components with Campbell, Callaghan, Tommy Durnin and Bevan Duffy, Keenan and Sam Mulroy up the middle. And with that sextet flanked by the energy of Anthony Williams, John Clutterbuck,

Liam Jackson and Conall McKeever, the Reds looked so much stronger than when trudging off the pitch at Páirc Uí Chaoimh eight days earlier.Notwithstanding Louth's major improvement in both organisation and intensity, Down played into their hands in Dowdallshill. The Mourne men's build-up was far too ponderous and offensive ventures regularly lacked momentum, leading to depressive spells of lateral ballwork.CLINICAL COMPOSURE Louth, therefore, were able to filter back into position before springing lethally on the counter-attack, three or four forward passes often enough to find entry to the scoring zone where Sam Mulroy and the shoals of inrushing runners were the beneficiaries. Campbell, Durnin, Duffy and Jackson each registered from fast-flowing sequences down the field. But the basis for Louth's victory was built on defensive solidity with Campbell and Callaghan vital in bringing the class of composure that was so lacking in all their prior efforts. Kevin Carr's clampdown on Donal O'Hare meant blunt Down could only score from distance, which Dylan Ward and Ryan Johnston did confidently ahead of half-time.Not that Louth were flattered by their 2-7 to 0-9 interval cushion, Keenan and Mulroy hitting the net on 11 and 32 minutes despite facing into the stiff, bitterly cool breeze that gusted towards the Newry Road. The second major was sublimely configured by McKeever, whose workrate, pace and accurate delivery to Mulroy from the flank saw the Naomh Máirtín sharpshooter compose himself before picking out the roof of the target off his weaker left foot.

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STOOD STILL Contrastingly, the closest Down came to enforcing a green flag wave was through Ryan Johnston, the leggy Kilcoo winger cutting into Wee County territory only to fumble in his battle to outwit Louth custodian Craig Lynch. The opportunity, at a time when the hosts' lead amounted to little more than two points, was critical to how the match panned out thereafter.

Kierans' crew were in pole place for a maiden triumph in Division Three, one imagined, with the conditions in their favour ahead of the restart. But the weather played no part in a confident second half return which produced a further 1-7; the flags which arrowed stiffly in the direction of the clubrooms during the opening period, after all, stood motionless when the action resumed; the chill of the October afternoon lessening in turn. And Louth's play will have kept the Down defence very warm.

Within six minutes the margin was extended by three to seven overall and after John O'Hare's disastrous kickout was gathered, carried and dispatched to the goal by McKeever, the lead was nine.

The visitors gained a degree of scoreboard respectability with a late flurry but they will require huge improvement for their Ulster trip to Fermanagh; that is if they're to avoid another early provincial departure.

For the second season on the trot, Louth have beaten Down in the league's final round. Overall, though, the pair's campaigns couldn't have been any more different.

Leinster SFC Preliminary Round

Louth 1-7 Longford 1-9

Is the fact that Sam Mulroy was Louth's only scorer in Sunday's Leinster Championship defeat by Longford grounds upon which to grin or groan?

The Naomh Máirtín forward was hailed by his manager, Wayne Kierans, as "not just an outstanding player, but outstanding young man" and future Reds skipper after a most disappointing defeat which draws a line under a hugely concerning campaign.

Kierans' post-match assertion that Louth "aren't a free-scoring team" is most accurate and the Mullingar loss was indicative of that, yet it was an affair in which the losers could so easily have emerged victorious.

Longford, by the standards they set last winter and spring, were underwhelming in sodden conditions and so Louth dominated both in the possession and territory stakes, albeit lacking the rudimentary ingenuity, craft and guile to laser their way through an often packed rear-guard.

It could also be argued that Longford's defensive wall was a symptom of the Wee County's lethargic, paceless approach to attack. Too often it took multi-phase moves to even breach the halfway line, by which time Mulroy and his inside colleague, Conor Whelan, were kept warm in the chill by several bodyguards in blue.

And the game's one glimpse of quality, aside from the individualistic kind, produced the decisive score when Longford midfielder Darren Gallagher was integral to an incisive handpassing move that yielded the No8's first half major.

The Reds had been dominant during the opening 10 minutes but were 1-2 to 0-1 in arrears having failed to punish an uncharacteristically slow start by the winners. But that was the encounter's tale: Louth were dominant for longer and yet unable to convert the sum required to book a quarter-final set-to with Laois.

Victory here would also have strengthened the case for Kierans' reappointment, and possibly afforded reason to allow him continue his investment in youth. Six players made





their championship bows at Cusack Park, four, including Dermot Campbell at full-back, as starters. Seven of the 20 players-used previously played minor football under the O'Connell's man.

SAM SUPREME

There was vast consensus that Mulroy was the match's outstanding performer and likely the first player in history to have scored his county's entire championship tally. Be it off right foot or left, the powerful Monasterboice native was an omnipresent touch of class in a game desperately low on high-calibre.

He opened the scoring from a free on three minutes and ended his team's 17-minute barren spell in advance of gathering possession in the left corner of the Dunnes Stores end, soloing past two or three defenders and firing a shot off the near-hand post and into the far corner, levelling the encounter seconds ahead of the half-hour mark.

Himself and Gallagher exchanged a pair of points before Daniel Mimnagh gave Longford a 1-5 to 1-4 interval advantage that, on the basis of play, they failed to earn.

Could Mulroy have been moved into the middle sector of the field? Perhaps. There, he could have picked out passes to those closer to the target and gone again to receive possession when running at pace in the desired direction. Any flurry of long-range registers would have been out of the ordinary and may have given Louth a winning platform. He was the only capable executor of such a plan.

As it was he had to fight as though practising MMA on every occasion the leather was punted his way, with referee David Coldrick, who was inconsistent and poor, very slow to award frees.

Whelan's half-time withdrawal was surprising, especially with his replacement, Paul Mathews, not the scoring option that was needed. And while the list of reserves wasn't lush with men adept to aiding Mulroy in the finishing department, the later introduction of Conor Grimes did sharpen Louth's offensive axe for the closing grind.





KEY CHANGE

Most agonising about the loss was the failure to capitalise on Longford's failure to score from 39th minute to the hour. Mulroy, hit a brace in the meantime -- his second was a stunner -- but Louth really ought to have taken firm control. They would have had Paddy Collum not got a foot to Anthony Williams' goalbound arrow.

Ultimately, it was a ghost from Louth's past, Robbie Smyth, who led the Midlanders to a qualifier victory in Drogheda three years ago, that swayed the triumph. Having won and converted a mark, the Abbeylara clubman shot over marvellously in the dying embers to seal victory.

Louth, in their desperate bid to salvage Delaney Cup hopes, resorted to carrying the ball into tackles and cheaply giving away the ball amid a frantic spell of additional time.

Just another one that got away.

When these sides clashed in the league 12 months ago, at Healy Park in Omagh, Tyrone inflicted a 15-point defeat on Paul McCormack's Louth, so a much narrower margin of defeat can be judged as a step in the right direction.

But it could have been so much better had Louth taken all their opportunities in this entertaining Division 3A encounter in Darver on Sunday afternoon.

When the home side opened up a well-merited five-point lead early in the second half, nobody watching from the grassy banks would have foreseen the final result. Ultimately, the turning point came on 58 minutes when, with the sides tied at 0-15 apiece, Louth were awarded a penalty only for Ryan Walsh's weakly-struck effort to be saved. The Reds opened their account with a pointed free on eight minutes from the reliable Darren Geoghegan (below) and a foul on full-forward Seaghan Conneely saw last year's leading light grab his second and third points, before Naomh Moninne colleague Feidhelm Joyce had Louth a point in front by the 12th minute Tyrone, with Damien Casey in fine fettle, regained the advantage, but Louth, to their credit, came again, striking four points unanswered, with Geoghegan (3) and Shane Callan registering.

Callan bagged a consolation goal for Louth, but Casey's ninth point of the affair ensured Tyrone departed relatively comfortable victors.

Paul McCormack reckons Louth have shown they belong in Division 3A of the National Hurling League despite losing both of their opening encounters. The Reds suffered a fivepoint loss in Longford on Sunday, a result which sees them rooted to the foot of the table alongside pointless Monaghan. Seven days after the footballers went down to defeat at Pearse Park, the hurlers never looked like faring any better, having opted to face the stiff breeze during the opening half. Nonetheless, McCormack is adamant his charges can recover to prime themselves for the visit of Donegal to Darver on Sunday week.





"There's no doubt the players are disappointed about where we're sitting, but they're the facts of where we are," the Armagh man told The Democrat.

"We'll be looking forward to this week's training and next week's in preparation for Donegal.

"I'm under no illusions that this is a tough league, but I feel we're well able to be competitive in this league and this is the league where we belong."

He added: "We didn't just reach the performance levels (of the Tyrone game) again. There were too many handling errors, too many basic errors in terms of use of the ball, and that definitely contributed to our downfall. If we can tighten those areas up again I've no doubt that we'll be competitive against Donegal and keep improving."

Alan Ward was ultimately the most painful thorn in Louth's side, Longford's marksman-inchief convert- ing eight of his 10 points before half-time, at which stage the winners were 0-12 to three in front.

And The Wee County's challenge hit the rocks within three minutes of the second period getting underway as Johnny Casey fired past Donal Connolly for the game's opening goal. Andrew McCrave's goal six minutes from time helped Louth to draw back the deficit, but were ultimately untroubled in their quest for victory.

"We completely dominated the second half, but just couldn't close the gap enough," the manager added. "The minutes after half-time just gave us too much to claw back, but, again, I can't fault the effort of the players. They put a huge shift in and the gap, which went from nine to 13, was just too much to bridge."We had a good phase of three points in a row and at the 28th minute mark (of the second half), it was 1-15 to nine, when we hit 1-1 to leave it a five-point game going down the stretch, over the last five minutes and injury-time."I felt we'd a chance, but Seaghan Conneely, who'd a great game for us, had a shot which went over the bar as opposed to going under and we probably needed a second goal to really turn the screw on them."It's a frustrating day for both players and management, in terms of not getting the rewards for the effort at training and commitment on matchdays.

It was a case of late despair for the second week in a row at the Athletic Grounds with title chasers Armagh having struck a controversial late winner with the game's final play, denying Louth from getting off the mark in Division 3A.

The Naomh Moninne youngster then fired The Reds into the lead, only for Gaffney to finish a penalty past Gerard Smyth in restoring the winners' advantage. The fact that Louth hung on is significant in itself. This is a Louth side has been cursed as recently as the opening round of the competition, where they befell to a late surge from their prospective final challengers Fermanagh.





Not to mention their league campaign, that ended in relegation, blighted with late collapses against Armagh and Donegal in particular. The record still stands - Louth are yet to win a championship match at U20 level, after three years.

Having had all of the play, it took The Reds some time to recover their composure from the body blow, with five of their 10 wides overall coming over a wasteful spell prior to Carl Gillespie, who gave an impressive individual account, establishing a two-point advantage at the halfway juncture, 0-6 to 1-1.So sharp was the Ardee man that it was a major surprise to see his withdrawal towards the close, at a time where Louth were in need of a clinical presence in front of the target.Clearly, Offaly held pole position at the turnaround, considering the gust and their more cohesive play, though The Wee County resumed positively, with Gillespie extending the gap from a free.However, by the time Louth would next score, Gillespie adding just the team's third point from play, their hopes of victory had faded extremely, Courtney's second goal, a flick of a hopeful punt, deflating the home outfit's challenge.





Aaron Kellaghan, son of former Offaly star Pascal, subsequently put The Faithful ahead and when Cathal Flynn followed it, the gap was two and Louth were staring at a hapless exit.

Yet they summoned a late push, albeit lacking the sort of ingenuity required to truly threaten Offaly's position of command. Powerful runners were needed and the directness of Craig Lennon, with Ciarán Keenan, brought life to Louth's play, which poses an obvious question: Why was the St. Mochta's man not introduced much, much earlier?

It's just one of many, all too familiar talking points.

Any victory in the Leinster Minor Championship provides a feel-good factor, and this sixpoint win over Wexford was no different as Louth set up a quarter-final date with Kildare on Wednesday week.

Overall, it was a deserved victory as the young Reds were in the driving seat for the majority of the game and outscored Wexford by 0-8 to 0-1 in the second half. Nine of Louth's final tally of 0-15 came from inside forwards Kyle McElroy and Tom Mathews who were lively throughout.O'Raghallaighs attacker McElroy finished with 0-7 from nine shots over the hour and the inside duo nicked late points to ensure Louth led at the break by 0-7 to 0-5.

Louth were leading by 0-5 to 0-2 after 16 minutes with 0-2 coming from Kyle McElroy with Lee Grifferty and Tom Mathews also finding their range. The pick of the scores came from Cameron Maher with a superb strike from distance.

Louth were in control at this point, winning seven from nine on their own kick out in that opening half, with Lee Grifferty (22 possessions), Beanon Corrigan and Brian Cafferty foraging hard. Defenders Ruairi O'Hagan, Con O'Donoghue and Cian Murphy made life very difficult for Wexford forwards, while Paul Brennan provided wonderful leadership from number six, flanked either side by Jamie Lee and Cameron Maher. After the water break, Wexford stepped things up, kicking a hat-trick of points through Rian Fitzpatrick and Michael Mackey (f), while a Jack Higgins strike bounced over the bar to level things up at 0-5 each after 23 minutes.

Louth's tactic of kicking as early as possible into Tom Mathews worked again, as Jamie Lee found the St Kevin's man who kicked over on the run to restore Louth's lead, before another point from Kyle McElroy following decent approach play by Fionn Meagher and Cian Murphy, gave the Wee County a two-point cushion at the interval.Louth would surely have been disappointed to let that early superiority slip. Some poor use of possession led them to being turned over 18 times in that opening period, which meant that despite being wasteful in front of the posts themselves,

Wexford were still in the contest.Kyle McElroy and Michael Mackey traded scores after the restart, and it seemed that it would continue to be tight, however, Wexford failed to score again until stoppage time as Louth pushed on, winning seven from 13 Wexford second half kick outs.

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Paul Brennan kicked over an inspirational point and it appeared to provide the impetus for Louth as Aaron Hoey's side scored six points in a row to all but seal a place in the quarterfinals with Kyle McElroy continuing to find his range with four second-half points.

Enda O'Neill, whose influence grew as the game progressed, finishing with 21 possessions in the match converted a free, while sub Sean Reynolds made a noticeable impact from the bench, striking beautifully over the bar from long range, and turning over the opposition twice, with excellent tracking back.

Wexford were awarded a penalty late on, which was converted by Rian Fitzpatrick, a goal which his own performance merited, however another Louth sub Cian Connor had the final say, raising a white flag as Louth prevailed by six to progress in the Leinster Championship.

County Development Officer County Board update

A Chara,

The main role of the County Development Officer is assist in the delivery of club officer development and club planning programmes for the principal club officers in the county, i.e. Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, and PRO. The Development Officer works with the County Committee and the Provincial Council in addition to other full-time and voluntary personnel in delivering the goals of the Association as set by the National Officer Development Committee.

The Club Leadership Development Programme (CLDP) provides learning opportunities to new and existing Club Officers in GAA, LGFA and Camogie Association Clubs to help them gain the knowledge and skills necessary to fulfil their roles.

The programme has been designed and is delivered by the GAA's National Officer Development Committee (NODC). It focuses on the practical aspects of the primary roles on a Club Executive, i.e. Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, PRO, Coaching Officer, Registrar and Irish Language and Culture Officers.

The NODC collaborates with the various functions in Croke Park, the Provincial Councils and County Development Officers to provide learning opportunities to Club Officers.

The following Club Officer training was organised via the Club Leadership Development Programme (CLDP) for Club Officers in Louth for 2020. 4 Primary Modules Chairperson , Secretary, Treasurer and PRO - (Tue 28th Jan-Darver). Office 365 module – (Tue 4th Feb- Creative Spark). Volunteer Recruitment Workshop – (Mon 10th Feb, Darver). Canva online Workshop for PROs – May 2020

For the 2020/2021 rollout, all module will be delivered online via remote webinar until further notice.





County Development Officer County Board update (continued)

The Club Planning Programme (CPP) is designed to support Clubs in the development, implementation and review of Club Plans.

The key features of the Programme include:

- \cdot Trained Club Planning Facilitators working with each Club
- \cdot A Club Planning Guide for Clubs together with online supports
- \cdot Implementation, monitoring and evaluation advice

The updated Club Planning Programme will support Clubs through the following planning process:

- 1. Club enters the Club Planning Programme
- 2. Appointed Facilitator meets Club Executive
- 3. Club Planning structures established
- 4. Club membership consulted
- 5. Club Plan developed and launched
- 6. Club Plan implemented and reviewed

The duration of this process will largely be at the discretion of the Club; however, the design and development phase should take between two to three months and the recommended Club Plan duration should be between three to five years.

COISTE IOMANA CHONTAE LU REPORT FOR ANNUAL CONVENTION

As Secretary of Coiste Iomana Co Lu I am pleased to present my report for Annual Convention 2020.

Unfortunately 2020 has been a year like no other with Covid 19 reaching these shores in March and as I write up this report we are still in Level 5 restrictions. Hopefully on the night that we hold our Convention restrictions will have eased and with the recent good news on the vaccine front, we can look ahead to 2021 with some optimism and get our clubs back on the field of play in the spring.

Pre Covid, agreement was reached with Leinster Council for a County squad at both U13 and U15 level to compete in the Leinster Cross County Hurling Leagues. This request was submitted as clubs had indicated that they would struggle with numbers to compete in the competition solely as a club team.

The following are the results of the games play by these squads prior to the country going into lockdown in mid-March. Leinster U13 Cross County League – Saturday 15/02/2020 Louth 2-3 Navan O Mahony's (Meath) 3-7 in Darver; Saturday 29/02/2020 Louth 1-6 The Saints/Colmcille's/Patrick's (Meath) 1-1 in Darver.

Leinster U15 Cross County League – Saturday 15/02/2020 Louth 1-6 Gael Colmcille (Meath) 1-1 in Darver; Saturday 07/03/2020 Louth 2-6 Maynooth (Kildare) 3-11 in Maynooth.

The enforced period of inactivity during the lockdown resulted in the postponement of two high profile underage hurling competitions which were the National U14 Feile na nGael Festival of Hurling and the U17 Celtic Challenge. It has been confirmed in recent correspondence from Croke Park that the 2021 National U14 Feile na nGael competition will not involve host clubs with the competition taking place on a weekend to be confirmed and will involve a grading day of games for clubs followed by competition the following day at venues around the country.

Following the confirmation that games could resume in early August, the committee members of Coiste Iomana decided that due to the time restraints that games would be played in only the U12 O'Broin Shield, U14 League/Championship and U16 League/Championship age groups.

Four teams competed in the U14 League/Championship competition with four group games being played before St Kevin's/Mattock/Glen Emmets and St Fechins contested the Final in Collon on Thursday October 24. In a low scoring match the combination side lifted the cup with a 2-0 to 0-3 victory.

Naomh Moninne and St Fechins qualified for the U16 League/Championship final which was played in Termonfeckin on Tuesday September 29 with the Dundalk outfit coming out on top in a well contested match on a scoreline of 1-12 to 0-10.

Only three teams fielded in the U12 O'Broin Shield competition with the 'A' Shield final taking place on Friday October 2. Sadly Michael O'Broin (Wolfe Tones) died on Friday September 18 and he will be remembered most for having served as both Secretary and Treasurer of Coiste Iomana Co Lu for many years. He also organised the Hurling and Helmet Scheme where clubs availed of equipment at a lower cost. During this time he also filled the role as Irish Language and Cultural Officer on the Co Board.

The Hearings ctte had a fairly quiet year given the pandemic background.

We dealt with a number of outstanding appeals from the previous year and an appeal case referred to us via the Rules Advisory ctte which involved another Gaelic games Association.

We also adjudicated on seven Transfer appeals arising from transfer decisions of the CCC.

Four of the appeals were upheld and one appeal which was refused was referred by the player to the Disputes Resolution Authority (DRA) .

That case was heard on 7.30pm at the Green Isle Hotel, St John's Dr, Newlands Cross, Dublin 22, on Tuesday, 21 July 2020 with Covid19 protocols applying. All persons attending the hearing were requested to observe social distancing procedures both inside and outside the hearing room. The venue had been selected due to the availability of a large hearing room and every precaution was taken to reduce the risk of transmission. Each party/committee was requested to limit their representation to two persons. Hand sanitisers were available and all persons were strongly encouraged to use face masks.

The DRA upheld the decision of the Louth Hearing ctte and we await the DRA written decision.

The Ctte had a very quiet year on the disciplinary front and dealt with the few cases arising including a disciplinary hearing at U18 level.

I would like on behalf of myself and the Chairperson Noel Litchfield to extend my thanks to the members of the hearings ctte themselves who were always available when requested throughout the year.

This year training took a different look because of Covid -19 and government restrictions County Children's Officer training was delivered online through the MS Teams app. First webinar was on 1st July. Second webinar took place on 29th August.





Training within Louth Safeguarding 1, Child Protection in Sport Awareness Training Safeguarding 2 Children's officer training

I would like to thank the clubs who hosted training nights this year and the tutors.

From January 2021:Any member of our association vetted by us between 1st January 2016 and 1st January 2019 must reapply to be re-vetted by the GAA and from 1st January 2021.

Each club has 6 months to complete this task.From 1st January 2021 vetting shall have a 3-year recognition period.

IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR ALL CLUB COMMITTEES AND PERSONEL INCLUDING COACHES AND MENTORS

Revised Child Safeguarding StatementYou will recall last year that all GAA Clubs in Ireland were required to carry out a Child Safeguarding Risk Assessment, following which they were obliged to then agree on the contents of a Child Safeguarding Statement. Clubs were then obliged to put that Statement on display in their Club premises or where Club teams meet or playThis is now a legal requirement in accordance with Children First legislation but has also been adopted by the Association to include all Clubs on the island of Ireland as part of our general good child safeguarding practices. The purpose of the Risk Assessment is to enable a Club, as in your case, to consider the potential for harm that may come to children while they are participating in our Games and other activities and to minimise and address such risks in an appropriate manner through the publication of your Child Safeguarding Statement.





This Statement reflects how the Club, having recognised the risks, will then ensure through good practices that as far as is practicable, children shall be safe from harm while participating in our games and activities.

These good practice procedures include the vetting or background checks of all persons who work in a role of responsibility with children, ensuring that coaches of underage players attend child safeguarding training, that they also have a minimum coaching qualification, that the Club has an anti-bullying statement and that in general the club takes its safeguarding responsibilities seriously and this is then reflected in the manner in which they operate on a daily or weekly basis.

The Code of Behaviour (Underage) contains much of what you require for your statement and we have published a new and revised Child Safeguarding Statement template that you may find to be most useful in completing the new Statement https://www.gaa.ie/thegaa/child-welfare-and-protection/childrenfirst

What is now required of your Club? We are now requesting that you replace last year's Child Safeguarding Statement with an amended version based on a template we have recently agreed with Tusla's Child Safeguarding Statement Compliance Unit. To do this please consider all that is included in the Risk Assessment form that your Club previously used for last year's Child Safeguarding.





The Risk Assessment form and the new Child Safeguarding Statement template was emailed to each club secretary.If, having examined the Child Safeguarding Statement template, your Club believes it accurately reflects and addresses the practices and procedures that are required to address identified safeguarding risks then you may add your Club logo to the Statement and put it on display in a visible area in the Club once it has been endorsed by the Club Executive Committee.

If the new Child Safeguarding Statement does not reflect the procedures and practices that are required to address all safeguarding risks in your Club then you should amend the statement and ensure that its contents addresses all such needs before you put the Child Safeguarding Statement on display in your Club.

Once you have completed your Child Safeguarding Statement please send a copy to your County Children's Officer.

Who should carry out this task? The Club Children's Officer is the named person or 'the relevant person' for the purpose of the Child Safeguarding Statement. Therefore, it is this person who should lead and oversee this task on behalf of the Club or the Club Executive. The Club Children's Officer will require assistance in completing all tasks and when the Risk Assessment has been completed and a draft Child Safeguarding Statement agreed it should then be forwarded to the Club Executive for consideration, discussion and ratification.





Who should carry out this task? The Club Children's Officer is the named person or 'the relevant person' for the purpose of the Child Safeguarding Statement. Therefore, it is this person who should lead and oversee this task on behalf of the Club or the Club Executive. The Club Children's Officer will require assistance in completing all tasks and when the Risk Assessment has been completed and a draft Child Safeguarding Statement agreed it should then be forwarded to the Club Executive for consideration, discussion and ratification.

Who endorses the Child Safeguarding Statement? Legally it should be the Club Executive Committee that endorses the outcome of the Risk Assessment and the content of the Child Safeguarding Statement. This should be done at a Club Executive Committee meeting and noted in the minutes of that meeting. The Statement should be signed by the Club Children's Officer.

When do we review the Child Safeguarding Statement again? Once agreed and put on display Clubs shall review their Child Safeguarding Statement review no later than 31st May 2021. This deadline is in accordance with legislative requirements.New email addresses for all Club Children's Officers. During the month of June our CLUB CHILDREN'S OFFICER EMAILS when live. The new email address will follow the format of other Club Officer emails e.g. childrensofficer.club.county@gaa.ie (there are still several clubs still to activate their emails)





Child Safeguarding Training: The GAA continues to deliver high quality child safeguarding training to more than 25,000 members per year who are working in a role of responsibility with children and young people. Our training, which has been most favourably commented upon by external bodies, has been enhanced on an ongoing basis so as to reflect the principles and content of our internal Codes, our Guidance and Safeguarding Policies and Rules.

Clubs may be aware that recent correspondence from Sport Ireland informed sports bodies that all training delivered must conform with the contents of the Sport Ireland training programmes.

Having met with Sport Ireland to discuss this issue we are happy to confirm that the Gaelic Games Associations will continue to deliver our child safeguarding workshops which are relevant to our needs and continue to comply with our legal requirements.

What does this now mean for our Clubs? Should a person present themselves to a Club as a potential underage coach or be approached to take up such a role they will in accordance with our procedures have to be vetted, must complete a minimum coaching qualification and must also complete Gaelic Games Child Safeguarding Training. They must complete these requirements prior to commencing any role with Children in our Associations





Following our discussions with Sport Ireland all that has changed is that if a person attends their initial safeguarding training (Safeguarding 1) with another sports organisation or with a Local Sports Partnership, we continue to recognise this training and the individual will then complete their child safeguarding training requirements by undertaking the new Gaelic Games on-line refresher training programme. (outlined below). The new on-line shall be completed by the individual within a time frame agreed with their Club. This agreement only applies to safeguarding training, as promoted by Sport Ireland, and is delivered by other sports bodies or LSPs. It does not apply to non-sports child safeguarding training.

Similar to all other underage coaches in any of the Gaelic Games Associations if a person attends their initial safeguarding training (Safeguarding 1) with another sports organisation or with a Local Sports Partnership and then completes the on-line programme they must still be vetted and must have a recognised coaching qualification.

New on-line child safeguarding programme available for GAA coaches As part of our joint approach to Child Safeguarding within the Gaelic Games Associations a new On-Line Child Safeguarding Programme was recently launched by the National Child Safeguarding Committee.

The On-Line Safeguarding Programme addresses a long-standing request that we introduce easy to access training as a repeat or refresher programme for those who have previously attended face to face child safeguarding training.

To participate and complete the on-line training a participant, i.e. a coach or a person working in a role of responsibility with or for children, must have fulfilled one of the following requirements:

1. They must within the last three years have attended a Gaelic Games Child Protection in Sport Awareness Workshop (Safeguarding 1) and they may then avail of the on-line programme in preference to attend another face to face repeat workshop, or

2. The participant, having attended a non-Gaelic Games Child Protection Safeguarding 1 Workshop with another Sports Association or a Local Sports Partnership (LSP), must then also undertake the new on-line Child Safeguarding Programme so as to familiarise themselves with our agreed safeguarding policies, procedures and in particular our joint Code of Behaviour (Underage) prior to commencing their work with children in any of the Gaelic Games Associations.

In addition to Safeguarding 1,2 and 3 workshops the GAA Children's Office can source a tutor for Clubs who wish to avail of the GAA Tackling Bullying WorkshopThe combined number of workshops delivered under Safeguarding 1, 2, and 3 this year is expected to surpass 1,000 far exceeding the numbers delivered in any other sector. Well done to all.

<u>Safeguarding Training Policy for Gaelic Games</u> This policy is part of the Safeguarding Statement for Gaelic Games under the Children First Act 2015, Children's First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children (2017), the Children (NI) Order 1995, Tusla's Child Safeguarding: A Guide for Policy and Procedures and Practice and as required by our Association Rules.

It is, highlighted in Section 11(3) Children First as being mandatory and is required for whatever the level of child safeguarding engagement one has in the Association. While we previously maintained this level of training as part of our good practice standards, and included it as part of basic coaching qualification requirements, safeguarding training is now mandatory in law. A list of typical roles to attend training appropriate to their role is included at the end of this policy.

Different levels of Child Safeguarding Training (see below) are now in place in Gaelic Games. Attendance at any of the workshops obviously depends on the role an individual has in any of our Associations. All training is delivered in workshop format and all workshops are of three hours duration unless specified otherwise below. This policy sets out the accepted Safeguarding Workshops for all Gaelic Games Associations together with any specific requirements for attendance and renewal of certification.

Renewing Safeguarding certificatesSafeguarding training requires renewal every 3 years unless specified below.

N.B .If you do not hold a *valid safeguarding training certificate, you cannot continue in your role until you refresh your training.

The Club & individual are both responsible to ensure that appropriate training has been completed and is valid.

*Valid certificate refers to a Gaelic Games certificate issued in respect of attendance at a Child Protection in Sport (Safeguarding 1) programme or the Sport Ireland or Sport NI equivalent certificate or the certificate issued following satisfactory completion of the Gaelic Games Safeguarding 1 Online Refresher programme. All Safeguarding certificates 1,2 and 3, are valid for a maximum of three years.

<u>Gaelic Games accepted Workshops</u> Gaelic Games Safeguarding Workshops are outlined as follows

Safeguarding 1–Child Protection in Sport Awareness Workshop (attending face to face workshop with qualified Gaelic Games tutor)

List categories of abuse and indicators associated with abuse. Make a report to the appropriate Statutory Authority. Make a report to a Designated Liaison Person, and or Association's Mandated Person

It is the responsibility of the individual and club to ensure that anyone working with, or who has interaction with, or who is involved in the planning/administration of activities or events with children and young people in our Associations, holds a valid Gaelic Games Safeguarding 1 certificate.

2. If a member of any Gaelic Games Associations presents a certificate of attendance from Sport Ireland such as attendance at an LSP or other Sports NGB's safeguarding training or a Sport Northern Ireland Safeguarding 1 workshop our member will be obliged to complete the Gaelic Games Online Safeguarding Refresher prior to commencing their role with the relevant Gaelic Games Association. The purpose of this is to ensure that those who work with children and young people receive relevant information on our own Gaelic Games safeguarding polices or practices, or our reporting procedures or our Code structures and on the role of Gaelic Games Children's Officers and DLPs in our three Associations.

3. Our Children's Officers and our Designated Liaison Persons in our three Associations are required to attend the relevant Gaelic Games work shop in order to receive information specific to their role of Gaelic Games Children's Officers and DLPs in our Associations and on our own Gaelic Games safeguarding polices or practices, or our reporting procedures or our Code structures.

4. Validation period commences from the date of workshop completion/date of certificate

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

<u>O'Raghallaighs</u>

Its brilliant that we get to finish off 2020 on the grass with coaching sessions before the winter break.

Wolfe Tones GFC

The Tones are a club who have made massive strides over the past few years and their coaches and club members have been a really important part in that, people like Lyndsey, Peter and Niall to name a few. At the start of the year, we finished the clubs underage winter program with players from the u13-u16. The club's coaches were very active during the lockdown attending a lot of our county webinars and numerous Club Turas workshops. The club school link is still extremely strong with St. Mary's PPS. The club hosted an intercounty u11 tournament with teams coming to play from 3 other different counties, it was a massive success. The club Cúl camp was a huge success apart from some rain which put a small dampener on things. At the beginning of the year the Tones also had 4/5 coaches who attended a foundation level course in the Plunkett's.



St Nicholas GFC

Another club who are making massive strides on and off the field. The nursery in the club is growing and the club improving their underage structure by linking up with the Tones. A very successful Cúl Camp was also held this year. The completion of the new club house has allowed us to be able to hold meetings and workshops indoors in the club. The club again have been very active during the lockdown and coaches have been upskilling themselves by signing into the webinars we had during the lockdown. The club school link is in place with St. Paul's NS and the club are reaping rewards massively from

Oliver Plunketts

The Plunkett's have worked hard in what I have been able to see in this difficult year. We started off the year by holding a foundation level course in the Plunkett's with 9/10 coaches gaining the award. I met with 7/8 coaches also In February to discuss developing a player pathway within the club to help get their underage team players into the club's adult squads while gaining all the important skills in between. Plans for a winter program had to be shelved because of the second lockdown. It was brilliant to have all the coaches logged into a Turas online webinar and into our county webinars also. Schools coaching in Mell NS also took place during the year. The club hosted a Cúl camp in the first week of camps and it ran perfectly with over 100 attendees.





Newtown Blues

Schools coaching took place in Aston Village Educate Together and surrounding schools to the Blues club. I met with the new coaching officers and some coaches at the beginning of the year and any plans put in place then where all scrapped because of COVID-19 19. The Blues decided not to run a Cúl Camp this year due to COVID-19. On the other hand, the Blues coaches engaged online during the lockdown on the county webinars.

South Louth Report- Sean Hand

S<u>t Fechins</u>

Fechins are an extremely active club and given the circumstances of the strange year they still managed to be very proactive. At the beginning of the year we finished our winter program which ran for 12 weeks Nov – Jan. In the early months there was plenty of interaction with Senior/Juvenile Coaching officers to help the club progress by educating coaches to ensure players receive highest quality of training. This coaching is also done through the school and post lockdown the two schools in the parish have been receiving 4 hours of coaching each week. The club also managed to have a successful Cúl Camp of 120 kids which was great to have in such difficult times. The club still has many club interactions with me assisting sessions and helping out coaching by offering new ideas and helping their needs. Between now and the end of the year we will have several interactions as well as get another winter programme in place.





<u>Glen Emmet's</u>

A very productive year with Glen Emmet's, club coaches are passionate and extremely active in the club scene. Myself and some of the club coaches met at the beginning of the year and discussed what the aim was for the year, we agreed that schools coaching was the priority which such a massive number of players in the school it was the ideal place to start. We began with 3rd who had a total of 78 kids across 3 classes who got coaching for 8-12 weeks before the lockdown came in. The club had also hosted a Cúl camp that accommodated over 120 kids we were lucky with the weather and it was a great week. Over the year Glen Emmet's received a few coaching sessions to help coaches freshen up their ideas while understanding different coaching styles.

Naomh Mairtin

Naomh Mairtin had an extremely successful year especially the senior team after they won the senior championship, this made coaching in the club very positive as the kids want to aspire to be like the senior team. On meeting the coaching officers at the beginning of the year there was also demand for workshops, winter programmes, school coaching and coach education. The 2 schools in the parish Tenure and Harestown receive 4 hours of coaching each week. The club had also hosted a Cúl camp that had over 130 kids attending it was a great week enjoyed by all and the kids didn't let the weather affect their enjoyment.





Mattock Rangers

Like other clubs in the region Mattock received a number of coaching sessions that helped coaches understand different coaching techniques as well as new ideas for training. They also ran a winter programme with Hunterstown for 8 weeks it was very successful and really enjoyed by all and is something that the clubs hope to build on for the next year. The club also hosted a Cúl camp of over 100 kids attending, before lockdown the school was receiving regular coaching but since lockdown the school did hold back on restarting coaching sessions as COVID-19 cases were rising and was safer to reassess later in the year.

Hunterstown Rovers

In Hunterstown this year there were several club engagements that assisted teams from schools coaching to underage and right up. We sat down at the beginning of the year and agreed that the biggest challenge in the club is participation numbers especially from parent's/Volunteers. There are only a limited number of coaches willing to volunteer therefore our plan was to encourage senior players to get involved in the basics of training so they can help out an hour or so before their own training and eventually encourage them to get their foundation award to help the club move forward. The club is really active and hosted a winter programme with Mattock that ran for 8 weeks, similar to the Collon school coaching has been put on the back-burner post lockdown to reassess COVID figures and to ensure it works safely.





Dundalk Report- Brian Óg Corr

<u>Clan na Gael</u>

The club has since wrapped up all training for the year since the last round of restrictions. Throughout the year I held meetings with coaching officer Gerry Smith to plan ways forward and ways to improve the club and maybe get more players in. During March we held an online Turas workshop which 10 coaches from the club signed into, this was then followed up by other visits working with different age groups. A winter programme with the club U16 team was planned but fell through after the latest round of restrictions.

<u>Dowdallshill</u>

The club is moving along nicely, and I had a number of interactions with their coaching officer Peter Hughes throughout the year. Their playing numbers have increased this year and the club hosted a successful Cúl camp. The main aim is to recruit more coaches to adequately deal with their playing numbers. I recently held a workshop for the club coaches themed around conditioned games which those who attended found beneficial.

<u>Sean O'Mahony's</u>

The O'Mahony's are progressing nicely, numbers are increasing, and they also have enthusiastic hard-working coaches. I held a Turas workshop in the club which was attended by 13 coaches. There then was follow up Turas visits with the U13s and U8s & 9s. Certain age groups within the club are continuing for as long as they can throughout the winter and plan to go into DKIT sport when the weather deteriorates. Overall, the club is moving in the right direction.



<u>Dundalk Gaels</u>

The Gaels continue to do a lot of good work with their under-age teams and are continuing to train throughout the winter months, with a programme for their players from u9s-u12 focusing on developing both sides of the body over a 6-week period. The numbers in their nursery group were exceptional with up to 80 children attending but it has since stopped due the current restrictions around training. The clubs U15/16 team are continuing training, working on different aspects of their game. The clubs also hosted it biggest ever Cúl camp this year with 130 children attending. There was also plans for an Easter camp, but it had to be pulled due to COVID-19. In February, the club hosted a foundation course with 24 coaches in attendance. The club has also developed a positive club/school link with St. Malachys.

<u>Na Piarsaigh</u>

Na Piarsaigh has several coaches eager to learn and develop. Their numbers at óg sport level are very encouraging with up to 25 children attending their nursery group. A Turas workshop was organised forthe club but fell through since the latest round of restrictions and the club has since finished up for the year. I have been in regular contact with club man Gavin McGee on how to move the club forward.

Louth coaching & Games staff delivered a few different coaching webinars over the course of May, June, and July and this offered something for every club coach from nursery up to adult level coaches. Thirty-eight coaches logged on over the course of the county webinars.

1st week of August Roche held the Cúl Camp with 105 in attendance, 73 boys and 32 girls. Monday to Thursday camp ran as normally, but rain on the Friday meant camp had to finish early. The 2nd weekend of August I helped assist in a very successful Inclusion programme every Saturday morning which give kids with a disability the opportunity to be integrated into the GAA community through fun games.





This ran until end of September and each week the numbers grew and credit to the coaches and parents for making this an enjoyable morning for the kids.September was the start of a new school term and I have been in Faughart NS every Monday delivering 1 hours GAA coaching to 60 children from Junior infants to 6th class boys and girls.The club have got me out to assist some of the coaches through their own sessions with the focus on covering the TURAS principles.

St Patricks

All Three schools took part in the 6th class boy's 5 a side indoor blitz in February which was held in St Patrick's Hall in Lordship, where several players where picked for the upcoming Tain academy. St Patrick teams took part in the DkIT Óg sport Blitzes every Saturday in February & March and performed well in all grades when football resumed in July, which is a credit to everyone involved with coaching and mentoring the teams.





From May right up to the end of July I ran a number webinars which focused on the TURAS principles, GAA Player 15 warm up & Live smoothie demonstration with Q & A. Also, during this time, I kept in contact with club coaches and players by creating skills challenges so players could continue to develop their skills at home. Louth coaching & Games staff delivered several different coaching webinars over the course of May, June, and July and this offered something for every club coach from nursery up to adult level coaches. Forty-Two coaches logged on over the course of the county webinars.

St Patrick's hosted the Cúl Camp the 3rd week of August with 150 children in attendance, 77 boys and 73 girls. The weather was good to us for most of the week although we had to cut our Wednesday camp short due to the rain.

September was the start of a new school term and I have been in Bellurgan NS every Wednesday and Rampark NS every Thursday delivering 1 hours GAA coaching to each class from Junior infants to 6th class boys and girls.

The club have got me out to assist some of the club coaches and to deliver session focusing on the TURAS principles.

West Louth Region – Craig Lynch Post Lockdown

I started my first term with this region in January as I started to contact clubs and the first move was when I sat in on the Kilkerley Juvenile AGM where they discussed the plans for the year and how to best utilise me. Other clubs hadn't much going on in January and was more February when they got up and running after club AGMs and nominating their Club Coaching Officers.



Annaghminnon Rovers created their own Nursery strand with huge success for the first time in many years and huge credit goes to them for resurrecting this. Fast Forward onto August after lockdown clubs cautiously came out to train and play again. I took the first of my Turas Club visit 1 with Kilkerley U8s and U9s on a Saturday morning where I showed the coaches how to work on Team Play while maximising space and utilising the coaches available. I also gave them a session template prior the session. We also went ahead and promoted the Clubs nursery starting in September. When the nursery came around, we had 20 kids on the day and 4 new coaches.

I led the session using the Turas model and prior the session giving these new coaches the template for the session and working alongside them to carry out the session. The 2nd nursery session Louth GDA Anthony Courtney assisted with Club senior player Sean Hand. All clubs were up and running efficiently in September and I was asked down to help St Brides U10s coaches with a Turas club visit 1 and work on Team Play with spatial awareness, on the day we had 3 coaches and 20 players.

In October Some clubs started to close up shop with the Level 4 NPHET recommendations but St Mochtas U9s invited me down for a session to work on Team Play and they found it a huge benefit as they had 19 players involved and 10 coaches down for the session and got great reports back after it. John Mitchel's similarly ran a session on Tactical Prowess for their U12s & U13s. There was 4 coaches and 18 players there on the night and once again was beneficial to all involved.





Currently we are looking at Winter Programmes for multiple clubs. All club visits would consist of a session with their players on a topic from the Turas Otú Model and a session template and feedback to and from the coaches in attendance.

Lockdown

Lockdown consisted of multiple online interactions with clubs showing huge buy in from all. During lockdown we ran 9 Online Webinars for the clubs which I will break down below and multiple online skills programs for their players to stay active during the lockdown. Overall, we had good attendance in West Louth with over 148 coaches engaging with us in a period of 3 months. I also sent out a skills challenge video on social media with over 3000 views and kids taking the challenge on themselves was brilliant. I also created individual skills challenges for the club and its players to try at home.

Naomh Fionnbarra

Dreadnots

Four boys, who are members of the club, got invited to attend for trials on foot of their performance, but sadly for them it couldn't go ahead. <u>O'Connell's</u>

In January of this year, a total of 3 players from Kilsaran school who are also players with the club were selected for the 6th Class Tain Academy after putting in great performances with them at the trials that were held in the Pavilion in Dunleer. The school team played against Callystown NS, Dromiskin NS and Tullydonnell NS. However, the Tain Academy never got fully up and running which was a shame for those players that were selected.



Some of the O'Connell's players participated in the U12 Pella games that were organised in the Pavilion in Dunleer for 6 weeks in January and February. Players from Lannleire, Dreadnots and Naomh Fionnbarra were there also and teams were made up of different players from all the clubs involved.

The U10 team had been going really well in the ÓgSpórt Lu Pre-Season games in DkIT Sport before it had to finish prematurely. It was a real pity that U8 only got 1 week as there were great numbers attending with O'Connell's entering 2 teams.

Schools coaching had been continuing until they had to close in March. However, the good news is that I will be back in for a 6-week coaching block between November and December and the school have been very helpful in arranging that this takes place safely and successfully.

Hurling GDA- Daire Hoey

Daire started in a part time hurling GDA role in January 2020. We got sorted with 20 Primary schools that wanted to receive Hurling coaching from Louth Coaching and Games. From January to March, 10 schools received coaching from Daire around the county. Unfortunately, with the country going into lockdown in the middle of March these schools never received their block of coaching. During the lockdown we hosted webinars with Martin Fogarty and also a discussion with Louth senior Hurling Manager Paul Mc Cormack. During the Summer we hosted 29 Cúl Camps in total with 2 of them been specific hurling only camps, Naomh Moninne and also Knockbridge Hurling Club. These 2 camps ran excellently with over 110 attending the 2 camps in total.Daire is back in schools since September and a lot of coaching is based around fundamentals as there are restrictions in schools with sharing hurls and helmets.





DkIT Report

Post Lockdown

January time our men's senior team unfortunately lost in the Trench Cup semifinal below in Portlaoise vs an excellent and winners of the Trench Cup Cork IT. Our ladies team done superbly and reached the Lynch Cup Finals weekend in March also Daniel Farrelly from our Handball club took his League 2 title in Belfast. Our Hurling team got narrowly beaten in the Corn Padraig MacDiarmada final. I got out to present the Lennon Cup Player of the Tournament prize to Bush player Cian Connor kindly sponsored by ABP Ireland where Cian's club Cooley Kickhams and school Bush PP both received €500 each.

Cúl Camps

The Cúl camps in 2020 went very successfully especially given the current global situation and the impact of COVID-19 throughout the country. Due to covid it was important that procedures were put in place and the camps ran slightly differently than previous years. This year everyone had to pre-book their place online and no walk ups would be allowed on the day, everyone entering the ground for the camp had to fill out a return to play form and continue to submit it each day for the duration of the camp. To be eligible to coach at the camps all applicants had to be 18 or over, keeping to the new coach to child ratio of 1:8. Almost 100 coaches were employed this summer as part of the camp programme.





The camps start date was delayed this year due to covid restrictions but the first week of camps began on July 20th with the final week finishing on August 21st. In all 29 Cúl camps were run throughout the county, with 2978 children taking part. These number were great given the circumstances and no doubt would have been higher only for the fact that this year the number of participants attending each venue was capped depending on the space available.

Overall, the camps proved once again to be a fantastic success and given the difficult times we are currently in there was no incidents to report.

Unfortunately, due to covid the U14s squad was not picked but plans are in place for the 2021 season.

Louth U15:

The U15 academy squad got back into the gym with Ciaran Sloan in January, twice a week. During February we started the trialing process for the coming year. We held 3 regional trials and identified a number of players to bring into the squad for further assessment. Unfortunately, before we could advance to the next stage the country went into lockdown, which brought everything to halt. We continued to keep in touch with the players send out skill challenges and conditioning exercises. The players then took up the challenge of running from Darver to Croke Park and logging their runs each day, which brought a bit of enthusiasm back to the group. Hopefully, we can get back to working with them more frequently over the next few months.



In January we finished our regional trials. Over the course of the regional games we had seen over 100 players each player getting six games this included semi-finals and finals to show their skill set. The panel was then made up of 50 players and over the next six weeks another ten players would be let go from the U16 panel. January and February the players got to enjoy new ways of training this included jiu-jitsu and some players were introduced to the gym for the first time. February mid-term the squad was brought in for two days where they worked on speed work and skills development. Also, in February we played a challenge match v Monaghan in Darver and this was our last outing before all football had to stop due to covid 19.

Louth Minors Report Post Lockdown

With the new management starting to take shape in early January everything started to come together with 3 training sessions weekly continuing with Aaron Hoey, David Reilly and Eamon Connolly on the pitch and Ciaran Sloan in the gym everything was going to plan when they took on three challenge games prior to lockdown vs Monaghan in Cloghan where they narrowly lost, vs Antrim in Dunsily where they won and vs Longford in Pearse Park where our boys lost. Coming out of lockdown in early September Aaron and the lads continued as they left off 2 pitch sessions and 1 gym session but the gym sessions where done by the players outside of Darver with the help of Ciaran Sloan. They played Down in Ballyholland on their first week back and played two teams in separate halves and won one game and lost the other.





They pushed hard ahead of the Leinster championship by adding new players and with some stepping away the group got smaller and tighter knit. They played Wexford in Darver in their Leinster Championship first round fixture where they put on a stellar performance to win and progress to a fixture vs Kildare.

Lockdown

During lockdown Ciaran Sloan took the brunt of the workload by setting out conditioning session. Ciaran gave the lads Nutrition info, Home S&C programs & Running sessions to keep the lads bodies ticking over.

U 13 Louth Hurling Academy -2020

The u13 hurling academy commenced training in late January and consisted mostly of the players who participated in the u12 academy from 2019. A panel of 28 players were made available from Naomh Moninne, St. Fechins GAA, Knockbridge Hurling and St Kevin's. With no club having sufficient numbers to enter the u13 Leinster Cross County, Coiste Iomana requested Louth Coaching and Games to seek permission from the Leinster Council to enter a combined clubs team representing the County at both u13 and u15 level. Louth Coaching and Games advised that the clubs have to look after the running of the teams but would assist with administration and logistical matters.This request was sanctioned with fixtures set for the 15th Feb v Ashbourne/Donaghmore (Meath), 29th February v The Saints (Meath) and 7th March v Clonkill (Westmeath).





With very little preparation time and no practice matches, the opening fixture against Ashbourne/Donaghmore proved to be a difficult assignment and they were well beaten by a more physical team. Despite the loss the team and management learnt from the experience and the next couple of training sessions demonstrated that there was an appetite to do better.

The second fixture with the players more familiar with each other and playing in positions far more suited to their ability they defeated The Saints comfortably. The final fixture was winner takes all against Clonkill. The fixture was originally fixed for the 7th but was postponed due to weather. With COVID headline news at this stage it was likely that this fixture would not be fulfilled, and this came to pass when on the 12th March, GAA suspended all activity. For 2020, I wish to thank Shane Lennon and Daire Hoey from Coaching and Games and to my fellow mentors, Dermot Plunkett (Knockbridge) and Brendan McCourt (Naomh Moninne).

Post Primary Teams:

Both the Dundalk Schools and Louth Schools teams started in October and Dundalk schools were beaten in their opener against Wicklow Schools with Louth Schools beating Carlow & Wicklow schools before been beaten by eventual winner Rochfortbridge in the quarter finals. I would like to thank our sponsors of the school teams Cullen Auto Parts, Oxigen Environmental & DKIT.

The 2020/21 school season is currently on hold until the lockdown 2.0 is over.





Ardee Community School:

A pilot project is being run in Ardee CS with the aim being to have a team competing in the Senior Leinster A competition by 2025. Covid has slightly altered the plan but training have continued as per the guidelines with 2/3rd years on a Monday and squad made up of 1/2/3rd years who can play U16 schools football next year are training on a Tuesday and Thursday and 1st years training on Wednesday. This will not just improve the school but also the clubs that feed into Ardee CS

Sky Sports Super Games 2020

Following the success of our super games in 2019 and the positive feedback we received from coaches and parents, we planned on 2020 being even bigger and better when it came to Louth GAA Super games. Unfortunately, with the current pandemic all plans were binned due to Covid-19, when we restarted and returned to play, the priority was our Cúl camps and getting our clubs back up and running. The Super Games were planned for a return to clubs and for clubs to run them internally to stop people from different clubs mixing. Unfortunately, with the second lockdown those plans have been put on hold.

Óg Spórt Lú

Another devastating impact of the corona virus pandemic was Óg Spórt Lú and our underage games programme which took a severe hit from mid-March through to mid-August where the football fields up and down the length and breadth of the county should have been filled with sights and sounds of children training and playing games.





We did manage to timetable 3 rounds of regional blitzes for the U7, U8, U9 and U10 between August and September with players and coaches delighted to be back in action. Instead of the normal 6 teams at avenue we now had to group only 4 teams. Unfortunately, the scheduled All County Blitzes in Darver for these ages could not take place as restrictions on numbers attending would not allow

Although they didn't get any All County Blitzes either, the U11s faired a bit better as they had a 6 week programme of games that began on Saturday 15th August until Saturday 19th of September with a starting time of 2.30pm. Similar to Coiste na nÓg, fixtures were arranged by clubs from the following regions: Dundalk & North Louth Mid Louth Drogheda & South LouthThe pre-season programme of games that take place during February and March in DkIT Sport for U8, U9 and U10 teams also had to be cut short due to COVID-19. The U10 teams managed to get 5 weeks of activity while the u9 teams got their 4 weeks.

Unfortunately, the U8 only managed to get 1 run out before it was cancelled.Everyone in the Drogheda region was very disappointed with the sudden closure of Drogheda Leisure Park leaving us with no venue to host the pre-season games for the clubs who were ready to play there. Despite contacting local schools and community halls an alternative suitable indoor venue could not be found and while clubs made themselves available the weather conditions hampered any chance of playing outdoors. It was also a pity that the enjoyable Winter Programme that generally takes place in Darver between September and October for U8, U10 and U11 teams also fell afoul of Covid 19 restrictions.

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Coach Education

Spring Learning & Development Programme

We managed to get through some of our Spring Learning & Development Programme despite the impact of Covid-19. The biggest casualty however was Award 2 Course which had been going really well with a total of 22 coaches in attendance – 14 from Louth, 7 from Meath and 1 from Offaly.

The group had completed 3 out of their 6 modules in Darver along with some assessments and practical work and were due to complete their remaining 3 modules in the Meath GAA Centre of Excellence in Dunganny. However, the course was paused and hopefully will resume some time in 2021.

Of the various workshops run by games development staff, the Conditioning Strategies for U16 – Adult players run by Louth GDA and Strength & Conditioning coach Ciaran Sloan attracted the most attention from clubs around the county with 28 coaches in attendance.

Coaching Webinars

Throughout May and June, Louth Coaching and Games ran a number of successful webinars with large numbers of coaches both from inside and outside the county logging in





Formal Coach Education Courses

There continues to be good attendance and demand for Foundation Award and Safeguarding 1 courses. The theory part of the Foundation Award course can now be done online and if any club is interested in Organising one for their club they can contact the regional GDA to arrange this. For Safeguarding courses is it best to go through the club's Children's Officer. Clubs are reminded that all adults assisting and helping with underage teams must have completed a Foundation Award course, have an up to date Safeguarding 1 Course done and be Garda Vetted.

Finally, Leinster Council have circulated details of all the Louth club coaches on their system that have completed formal education courses such as Foundation Award, Award 1, and Award 2. This is very valuable information for every club to have. Should any club like to receive their own club coach's status please contact their regional GDA or Coach Education Administrator Mairead Monahan.

















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<u>Cultural Report 2020</u>



The Louth Gaeltacht Scholarships took place earlier than previous years. This took place in Darver on February 1st with 49 participants each receiving a €100 scholarship to be paid to their Gaeltacht. Coláiste an Phiarsaigh matched the county boards scholarship and offered a further €100 scholarship (to be taken off the course fees) to the participants who were going to their Gaeltacht.

These Gaeltacht courses, however, did not go ahead.

The Louth county Scór Sinsir competition took place on February 26th in Naomh Mairtin's Hall and consisted of three entrants, all from Glen Emmets. We held a Tráth na gCéist on the same night which was attended by 5 clubs. Glen Emmets won on the night. The Leinster rounds did not go ahead. We were represented in the Leinster Scór na nÓg Final in two categories aswel as the Tráth na gCéist my members from Naomh Mairtins and Newtown Blues. The 2020 Scór na nÓg did not go ahead.

During the lockdown, a Virtual Scór was run. Louth was well represented with 10 entries from Clan na Gaels, Newtown Blues, Mattock Rangers, Glen Emmets, Kilkerley, Naomh Mairtins and St Josephs. Thanks to all the CCC committee members, Padraig McDonnell, Brian Carrig, Frank Scriven, Sean Byrne, Denis McArdle, Aiden Haplin and in particular our secretary Stephen Murphy. It has been a very challenging year but with the fantastic work by the members of the CCC, the clubs and players we were able to schedule the fixtures and competitions to allow games to be played in an orderly and timely manner.

Competitions

We started the year with a new and complete fixture calendar which clearly laid out all fixtures and competitions. Unfortunately, this calendar soon became irrelevant as the government and GAA imposed Covid 19 restrictions seen games being postponed and cancelled. Despite a few false starts we managed to complete the majority of the competitions. I would like to thank all the clubs and players for their co operation through out the year. As the restrictions forced us to fix and rearrange games at very short notice the clubs and players continued to fulfil their fixtures without complaint. There has been very positive comments form both the clubs and players regarding the way the championship was scheduled this year and is a subject we will look closely at this year again.

It was with deep regret and disappointment that we were unable to complete the league programme and fulfil the U20 and Junior B championship. We took the decision to cancel the remainder of the competitions when new restrictions were imposed in October and would not allow games or training to continue until at least the beginning of December.





We felt it would be unfair to ask players to return to championship games in the middle of winter with no training or game time prior to the competitions.

The year as usual started with the Paddy Sheelin Cup and Kevin Mullin Shield competitions which proved a challenge to fulfil due to the bad weather but with thanks to the staff in Darver we continued to play the competitions and complete the majority of the games before we were forced to suspend all competitions in March due to Covid 19 regulations.

When the regulations were eventually eased in August, we were again able to return to competitions. Following a lengthy debate at a County Board Executive online meeting, it was decided to proceed with the league competition on the following basis. The leagues would be divided into groups and played without promotion or regulation. The Championship would proceed as normal, but the quarter and semi finals would be completed on the day with no replays. It was also decided that, where possible, all championship games would be played in Darver as spectators were either not allowed or capacity was restricted, and this would allow the games to be televised by LuTV and broadcast live. This proved to be a great success.

Congratulations to the championship winners, Naomh Mairtin on winning their first County Senior Football Championship, Knockbridge HC on their success in the Senior Hurling Championship, St Brides following a 53 year wait, won the intermediate football championship and Naomh Fionnbarra who after a closely fought game, won the Junior football final.



Congratulations also to the remaining finalist who provided top quality football, hurling and entertainment on the day, St. Marys, St. Fechins, Kilkerley Emmets and Lann Léire.

We have developed a programme to train and educate our referee's which we will implement in 2021. Continuous training and assessment is required to ensure our referee's meet the standards required at the top level.





Disciplinary infractions still remain a concern and we would encourage clubs to train and educate our members on the rules and infractions. It is as important to play within the rules as it is to train and play the games. There is no tolerance within the CCC for abuse to the referee's and officials from either the players, team management or supporters.

The 4 Group team winners of the preliminary round of the All County Championship gets entered into the remainder of the competition with the 12 Senior club teams making 16 teams altogether.

• The 16 teams play off in a knock out Championship in which county players must be made available to play in.

• The All County Championship will be played at a time that suits The County team depending on if they are in tier 2 or still in the All-Ireland series and will be completed before the normal championship starts.





• The All County Championship knock out matches get finished on the day.

• A Playoff match between Joe Ward winners and All County Championship winners will take place. This match will be completed on the day.

• If the winner of this playoff is a Senior Club team (i.e. not a Group team) they will go on to represent Louth in the Leinster Club Championship.

• This playoff will not occur if the winner of the Joe Ward also wins the All County Championship and that team will automatically represent Louth in the Leinster Club Championship.

Motion 6

Motion : Revert back to system where Championship Status determines League Status

Our Proposal is to return our competition structure where your league position in the previous year's league will determine both your League and championship for the following year.Example for clarification.An intermediate team that gains promotion via the intermediate league, will, the following year compete as a senior team in both league and championship. Likewise a team that has been relegated from the Intermediate league will compete the following year as a junior team in both League and Championship. If a club win their respective championship they are automatically promoted to the next higher division. A team that wins the championship cannot be relegated, the next lowest team will be relegated in both league and championship.

Relegation only to be decided by the league.

Motion : Revert back to system where League Status determines Championship Status

Division 3/ Junior:The top team in the league and the championship winner go up in the league and championship. Second and third placed teams will playoff and the winner will play the team placed third from bottom in division 2. The winner of this game will play in Division 2 and intermediate championship the following year. The loser will play in Division 3 and Junior championship the following year

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Division 2/ Intermediate:

Team which finishes top of the league following a full league programme will be deemed league winners and will be automatically promoted in both league and championship, the teams placed 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th will play off and the winners will play the team placed 3rd from the bottom Division 1. The winner of this playoff will play in division 1 and senior championship the following year. The loser will play in Division 2 and intermediate championship the following year

The championship winner will be promoted the league and championship

Bottom 2 teams in the league are regulated in both league and championship. The team which finishes third from bottom will play in a regulation playoff place with the winner of the Division 3 league playoff game. The winner of this game will play in Division 2 and intermediate championship the following year. The loser will play in Division 3 and Junior championship the following year

Division 1/ Senior:

Bottom 2 teams in the league are regulated in both league and championship. The team which finishes third from bottom will play in a regulation playoff place with the winner of the Division 2 league playoff. The winner of this game will play in Division 1 and senior championship the following year. The loser will play in Division 2 and intermediate championship the following yearA team cannot be regulated if they win their championship. The next lowest team in that League Division will be regulated in both league and championship.

Next 3 years or until the competitions align (whichever is first)

Junior is good Intermediate and Senior Playoff winner in the league and the championship winner go up in the league and championship.

If this unbalances the league or championship competitions the following criteria will be used to align the competitions in this order.





1. Highest placed Division 1 team (or teams if more than one is required to redress the balance) playing in intermediate championship will move from intermediate championship into senior championship

2. Lowest placed senior championship team (or teams if more than one is required to redress the balance) playing in Division 2 will move from senior championship to intermediate championship

During the time of rebalance a team playing in senior championship cannot be regulated to Division 3.

If the competitions are aligned after the regulation and promotion then the following criteria will be used only for the next 3 years or until the competitions align (whichever is first)

1. The intermediate championship team which finishes lowest in league 1 will be demoted to Division 2 and the senior championship team which finishes highest in Division 2 will be promoted to Division 1

There would be no regulation in the championship whenever the competitions align. The league will be the competition which will determine your championship status

It is our belief that the existing competition structures in Louth GAA have contributed to the lessening of competitiveness of our county senior team. We believe that a return to the structure as ascribed in the motion will give Louth Football the best chance of producing the consistent calibre of player to help return Louth football to the higher ranks of GAA.

We all know that in the past Louth were consistently challenging at the latter end of the Leinster championship and we believe that this was largely due to the quality of players the competitive nature that our leagues provided. The previous changes to the present league and championship structure, while done so with the best intentions, have had a real detrimental turnaround in the fortune's of Louth football. There have been some consequences of this change, Louth Club teams who have tasted success at provincial level, have done so by competing at a lower grade than their league status. When you look at this year's championship winners you see that the junior championship was won by an intermediate league team and the intermediate championship was won by a Senior league team.

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While this anomaly has allowed some of our club teams be successful at the provincial level and we don't wish to tarnish these successes, but these successes are not a true measure of the standard of teams we are producing, as most of these success have come at a lower level then the winning team's league status in our county and we don't believe it should continue.

With all things being equal, the higher the level of competitive club football a player is playing the more consistently tested he will be, and it is only by facing this challenge in each and every game that a player grows. This lack of consistent competitive challenges we believe have denied our club players the chances to improve physically, competitively, tactically and skilfully. Since 2010 Louth football has slumped alarmingly and now sit firmly in the bottom ranks of Div 4 in the national league.

We have a serious problem when our senior team is rooted in Division 4 while our club teams are only able to be successful at provincial level by playing at a grade lower than their real status. We need to help our senior team be successful by giving our players the tools THEY need to be successful, and the first step on this is to fix our broken competition structure. That's why we firmly believe that a return to the format of league positions determining your championship status, is a vital factor to help Louth football progress.

Motion 7 RESERVE TEAM PROMOTION PROPOSAL

We set out to find a way to have reserve team promotion to the first team leagues while at the same time addressing the concerns of clubs.We firstly tried to address a couple of important issues and then come up with a proposal.The main issue junior clubs had originally was how first teams were affected by performances of reserve teams both in games and in promotion and relegation.Since the introduction of D3b first clubs cannot be relegated to the reserve teams' leagues so reserve teams would not affect the status of first teams in D3a.It was felt that reserve teams could be strong or weak at different times of the season depending on how many players were required to play for their first team. Listing a top 20 would mean that the reserve team would be selected from practically the same squad each week with little to no reliance on first team players and would therefore be of a similar standard throughout the season.

There was also a worry that reserve team matches could be conceded as this had happened the last time reserve teams played in D3. It was agreed that the CCC would decide if the reserve team had adequate numbers to maintain a position in D3a so the reserve team would not be promoted without the approval of the CCC.

It was also felt that reserve teams should not have to accept promotion, they are free to remain in D4 if that is their preference.

Below is the outline proposal for reserve teams to be allowed promotion from D4 to D3a.

Outline proposal

Reserve teams can win promotion to the top 3 Divisions providing that:

1. Club names top 20 players that can only play for their first team and further name top 12 players that can only play for their second team.

2. Club agree to playing matches on the same day as their first team where necessary 3. The club does not have to take the promotion, they do not have to go to D3a if they don't wish to.

4. Final approval from the CCC

Reserve teams cannot be promoted to or relegated to D3(b)

Relegation from D3(a) and promotion from D3(b) will remain as is currently and relegation or promotion of 'reserve' teams will not affect this process. The final placing of a reserve team in the league cannot affect the promotion or relegation of a 'first team' playing in D3(a). In other words, the number of 'first teams' being either promoted to or relegated from D3(a) stays the same as is currently.

Reserve teams relegated from D3(a) are relegated directly to division 4

It is suggested that in year one that the top 2 teams from D4 will be promoted to D3(a) bringing that division to 8 teams. Thereafter the lower finishing reserve team will be replaced by the team winning D4.

Promotion for reserve teams is capped at D3a. There is no promotion to D2. This will be reviewed after 3 years.

These rules apply to league only as reserve teams cannot enter the senior, intermediate or junior championships. Reserve teams playing in the top 3 leagues will only be eligible for the D4 championship. This is a trial to be reviewed in full after 3 years.
