Og Sport Silent Sidelines

The Silent Sidelines initiative was rolled out at U7 and U8 All County Blitzes and has been warmly received by all clubs in attendance with coaches understanding and appreciating the merit of Silent Sidelines. Yvonne Quigley from the Health & Wellbeing Committee along with staff from Dundalk Credit Union – who were sponsoring the initiative were on hand during the July blitzes to promote and publicise the idea to coaches and supporters.

The initiative aims to create an environment where children can play GAA free of criticism or critique.

Clubs, coaches and parents are encouraged to 'Just let them play.' The guidelines are as follows:

- One designated coach per team to provide instruction and will be wearing s Silent Sideline bib.
- No shouting at players from parents or non-designated coaches.
- No instructions to players from parents or non-designated coaches.
- Positive encouragement for all players on the pitch is encouraged.
- Let the children make mistakes.
- Let the children concentrate on the game.



Competitions Control Committee Report 2024

A Chairde

Please find a breakdown of CCC season 2023, as a committee we meet many times both face to face and on TEAMS to deal with transfers, disciplinary issues, fixtures, match official appointments etc.

Competitions

In 2023 the CCC continued with previous years competition structures with the addition of an U19 development league, this development league was played following the decision to keep minor football at U17, in the development league teams were able to name players over the age of 19 to allow clubs fulfil fixtures. The weather at the start of the year played havoc with early fixtures and it's a testament to all clubs that we were able to work together and get all fixtures played.

The one area which caused concern/frustration is postponing and moving matches to later dates, in 2024 this had a knock-on effect to other competitions, teams and indeed match officials, we urge clubs going forward to only move matches when necessary and in 2025 the CCC will be implementing regulations around refixing matches.

U19 Football Development League

The U19 Development league commenced at the end of February; most group stage finished in May but some back fixtures were not completed until June delaying the finals of these three leagues.

Subsidiary Football Competitions

The subsidiary competitions in 2023 were played midweek to enable the U19 Development league to play matches at the weekends, this caused some issues with pitch availability, and I would like to thank the clubs, and the persons involved in pitch allocation in Darver for helping us get these competitions completed. In both the secondary competitions in these subsidiary leagues there were a high number of concessions, I believe this should be looked at for 2025 and in a recent questionnaire to clubs the common theme submitted to the CCC that there are too many matches in these early competitions.

Adult Football Leagues

In 2023 like previous years the CCC submitted to clubs a fixture calendar/planner, the aim of the planner is to give all players a look ahead to matches, this year due to the intercounty season being extended following Louths magnificent run unfortunately it did affect the planner, matches being pushed out as within the current Bye Laws for the split league county players must be available to play. I would urge clubs to look at this going forward for two reasons, in the first rounds where intercounty players were available to play less than 8% of the players actually played with their clubs and also following a review of the finishing league places the extra points for the split league fixtures in most cases did not affect the finishing positions had all matches been played for 2 points. We really need to look at this for 2025, club players appear to want the extra matches, but the reality is to give a definite fixture planner which is also what club players want we need to look at the split league rules.

At this point in time all the league matches have been completed apart from the division 3A/3B promotion/relegation play-off.



The Division 4, 5 and 6 league matches were played as per planner for most of the year, it is still difficult the right balance between the end of the league matches and the start of the 2A and 2B matches, the gap for some teams was many weeks and given the condensed calendar around June/July the finals of these leagues were pushed out. The CCC will look at this for 2025 but will need the support of the clubs involved to make some changes at this grade to allow a more consistent flow of matches.

Hurling Competitions

In 2024 following a review of the proposed fixture with the hurling clubs in Louth it was proposed to play the Senior Hurling Championship before the Senior Hurling League, I believe this has worked in a positive manner and the CCC will meet with the Hurling clubs early next year to review 2024 and implement any lessons learned. I would like to thank Dowdallshill hosting the Senior Hurling Championship matches in 2024.

Adult Football Championships

The Adult Championships followed a similar format to previous years, a big thank you to all the clubs who put forward their clubs as venues for hosting championship matches, without these venues the championships would not be as successful as they are currently.

In 2024 there were a total of 50 transfer requests in football, 44 were granted and 6 were refused following hearings with all concerned. There was also 7 Hurling approval forms submitted in 2024 all were sanctioned.

Sincere thanks to all the clubs for their help and assistance on many different occasions throughout the year, the club members are the life and soul of the GAA and without you all we would not have been able to fulfil all the fixtures. A particular word of thanks to the club secretaries, when we set out fixtures and these get moved for many different reasons you are always the first port of call and in most cases one fixture change can lead to many phone calls and emails.

Condolences to all club who have lost members and loved ones throughout 2024.

Finally, a big thankyou to the CCC members, you were always at the end of a phone and ready to meet at short notice when required.

Óg Sport Lú Annual Report

The Óg Spórt Lú season provides Go Games opportunities for U7-U11 underage players from March to November each year. This year once again has seen fantastic numbers participating in all the various activities with over 4000 children playing football and 250 playing Hurling at Go Games level within the County.

Huge praise must go to the clubs and club coaches across the county who continue to promote Go Games and help develop their underage players. Thank you is also due to the County Coaching and Games Staff who supported delivery of these games in particular Mairead Monahan, Paddy Lynch and Ger Malone.

Despite a slow start which was caused by the poor weather in the early part of the year there was a comprehensive programme of games provided for our young players. See below summary of our Óg Spórt Lú schedule and the number of blitz opportunities provided at each age group:

Post Primary Schools/Leinster A Project

Coaching and Games staff continue to support the development of our games within post-primary schools through a combination of schools coaching and the delivery of post-primary blitz days which take place monthly.

In September 2024 we launched the Leinster A Project in De La Salle Dundalk, Marist Dundalk, Ardee Community School & St Joseph's Drogheda. The program provides a grant from Louth GAA towards GAA promotion and in return the schools must complete 2-3 sessions a week with their 2nd year team. One session with an external coach, one session with a Louth GAA staff member and one session with teachers. Ardee CS currently compete at A level while the other schools are B & C level, but the aim is to have all four schools competing at A level over the next few years.

In May, we hosted a 15-a-side blitz in Darver to allow our schools to play against other A grade schools from across Ulster and Leinster. We had 5 schools from Louth (Bush, Marist, Ardee CS, St Marys Drogheda and De La Salle) competing against top tier schools from Armagh (St Ronans, Lurgan), Cavan (St Patricks, Cavan). Kildare ((Naas CBS), Monaghan (St Macartans, Monaghan) & Tyrone (St Patricks, Dungannon). Naas CBS defected St Marys Drogheda in the final of the cup and St Ronans, Lurgan defeated Bush in the final of the shield. All Louth teams competed well on the day.

Gavin Devlin has also been actively involved with coaching in schools who are not currently within the Leinster A Project. His work and that of all the staff in Coaching & Games is complementing the hard work of post-primary school teachers across the county who continue to promote our games.

Louth GAA Coach Education

There was a total of 14 Formal Coach Education Courses run this year by Louth GAA Coaching and Games. They included one Award 2 Football Coaching Course, two Award 1 Football Coaching Courses and 11 Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games Courses. Of those Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games Courses, 8 of them were for Football coaches, two of them were for dual Football and Hurling Coaches, and one was for Hurling and Camogie Coaches.

This year we had 10 participants undertake the Award 2 Football Coaching Course. This course is aimed at experienced coaches that have progressed through the Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games/Foundation and Award 1 programmes. There are 8 different modules, both practical and theory that the coaches attended and when completed they must submit their assessments and logbook to Leinster Council. All 10 coaches have invested an enormous amount of time and effort into completing their Award 2 Course of which they must be commended for. The knowledge and experience they have gained will be of huge value to their club and the teams they are involved with.

A total of 25 coaches completed the Award 1 Football coaching course this year. In order to attend this course coaches must have their Introduction to Coaching Games Certificate and have at least 1 year experience of coaching with a team. With having more coaches with the Award 1 Coaching qualification the greater the opportunity that players and teams are coached in a way to enable them to achieve their full potential. In 2025 we would be optimistic that more clubs will encourage their coaches to attain this qualification for the benefit of their teams.



The Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games Courses remains the most sought-after course for club coaches to complete. Not only is it necessary for every person involved with coaching underage children, along with Garda Vetting and GAA Safeguarding, if provides all new coaches with the foundation, knowledge and confidence required as the begin their coaching journey.

Looking ahead to 2025, the Louth GAA Coach Education schedule will be circulated in January with more Award 1 and ICGG courses planned. If any club would like to host an Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games Course in their club, please contact their respective Games Development Coordinator for more information.

The GAA will also be launching a new Nursery Course which coaches who are only starting off with the nursery age group in their club can be take. This course will be certified and as with the other courses it will be visible on their Tobar account.

Informal Coach Education

Following the winding up of the Games Promotion Officer scheme the County was divided into 7 areas and each Games Development Coordinator was allocated a number of clubs to work with to provide coaching support. See below:

At the time of this report staff had delivered 27 Club Development sessions including Coaching and Games Reviews and assisting clubs with forming 12-month action plans for C&G. They have also delivered 92 Club Coach Mentoring Sessions with club coaches and 20 Club Coaching sessions with teams. Engagement from some clubs has been excellent, however, we would like to see more of our clubs engage on a more consistent basis.

Additionally, we provided four Coaching Workshops during the Spring to help prepare club coaches for the forthcoming season:

- Back to the Basics of Goalkeeping Liam Swift
- Games to help coach Nurseries Paul Carvill, Healthy Kidz
- The Basics of Striking in Hurling Conor Clancy, Louth Hurling Goalkeeper
- Speed Development for GAA Athletes Ciaran Sloan, Louth GAA Performance & Talent Lead

Attendance at these workshops were mixed, with many coaches registering for the events and then failing to attend, going forward we would like to see greater uptake from clubs and club coaches.

Cúl Camps 2024

Once again 2024 proved to be another great year for Cúl camps across the county, although the national average has decreased due to changing demographics, Louth once again seen an increase in participants with 39 camps taking place, with Clan na nGael camp running for the first time in 2 years with over 40 boys and girls taking part. In all 3670 children took part. This year we also ran a very successful GAA Inclusion camp which proved very popular, with great feedback coming from it.

This year there was 120 coaches employed. All coaches had to be over the age of 17 however those over 18 got first preference on ensure with the correct ratio between coaches and players. Once again, all coaches did the appropriate training days, were safeguarded and all had completed their Introduction to Gaelic Games.

In general, the camps ran very successfully and with greater numbers playing our games and the feedback has been very positive, preparation for next year has already started. The challenge for 2025 will be to support all clubs in the County to host a camp and maintain the current participation numbers given the forecasted demographic reduction across the County next year.

Thank you to all Coaching & Games staff who coordinated and managed to camp with particular thanks to Brian Og Corr who led out in this area and did an excellent job.

There has been some fantastic work undertaken by both C&G staff and volunteer coaches to develop the next generation of players. It is important to note that the aim of our Academy is not only to produce future intercounty players but also to develop players who can go on to play with their clubs and schools at the highest levels.

The addition of Gavin Devlin as Underage Football Development Coordinator has added considerable knowledge and experience to the staff. He has been working consistently with all squads and squad coaches to develop a 'Louth Way' of playing football and this curriculum is now being rolled out across all squads.

One area that was identified from previous years, was that players needed additional support and position specific training. As a result, we have had Blaine Hughes deliver goalkeeper specific training to all Academy football goalkeepers over the past 4 months.

During the Summer months players attended Darver one day per week to be provided with additional training and support in areas such as performance analysis, nutrition and athletic development. This was a huge success with hugely encouraging feedback. With this extra commitment comes a greater workload for parents and we thank them for their continued support.

In November, as part of our ongoing emphasis to support our players as young men, we hosted a 'Better People = Better Players' welfare conference. This was well attended with over 90 squad players present. On the day there were guest speakers to deliver workshops in key areas identified to support our young people. The speakers included:

- Stephen Murphy, Louth GAA Coaching Officer provided an overview of the Academy structure with Louth GAA
- Oisin McConville, Former Armagh player and Gambling Care Ambassador delivering a 'Gambling Awareness Workshop'



- Maura McMenamin, Ulster GAA & Garda Síochana delivering 'One Punch' workshop warning of the dangers of one punch attacks on and off the pitch
- Dundalk Credit Union delivered a workshop around 'Protecting Young People from Financial Fraud'
- Q&A with Peter Fortune (Louth Hurling Captain), Peter Lynch (Louth Footballer) & Oisin Conaty (Armagh Footballer and 2024 Young Player of the Year)

Feedback was very positive, and this is something we hope can be rolled out incorporating other key messages and workshops.

U13 Hurling Sub Academy Squad

2024 saw the formation of our under-13 skills school which was made up of players from five clubs & proved to be a huge success. Sincere thanks to David Andrews, Ricky McKeown and David O'Connor for their assistance throughout the year.

U14 Football Academy Squad

7 aside Blitzes Trial Phase 1

In February 2024 over 2 weekends, we ran a 7 aside blitzes where all clubs had the opportunity to enter a team, some clubs entered 2 teams due to playing numbers that they had at that age group.

These small, sided games were played in Darver, Div 1 teams came in the morning slot to play, Div 2 teams in the afternoon and Div 3 teams' late afternoon. All teams played 3 matches at their own level, in a comfortable environment with their own teammates.

The club coaches would send across a team sheet in advance to the U14 development squad mentors with the players jersey number, and if a player was performing well, they'd be highlighted and asked to attend phase 2 of the trial.

March 2024 Phase 2 Regional Trial

Anyone who got a call back from phase 1 attended regional trials, these were 15 aside games and all players got 2 games to impress. By the end of March, the U14 mentors put a squad of 52 players together.

Thank you to Louth coaching and games staff for helping oversee phase 1 and 2 of the trials and to the referees who refereed the games during the trial period.

Main Season

Once assembled, this squad trained once a week for 60 minutes, due to large numbers the group would be split into 3 groups and each mentor would take a group and every 12 minutes the groups would rotate. One mentor would focus on skill development, one on scoring and one on small, sided games.

Our 1st outing was on May 4th against Meath in Dunganny & 25th May was our 2nd outing against Wicklow in Darver. These Games gave the players the opportunity to play at a high level and the coaches got the opportunity to learn and develop content for the upcoming session to help improve players.



During the summer break the squad trained twice a week, Ciaran Sloan took the group for gym and pitch sessions during the day on Tuesday and the u14 coaches took the session on the Wednesday evening.

The next round of fixtures was played on the 13th July, 3rd August and the last round of fixtures on the 17th August. Teams played on above dates where Kildare, Meath and Longford. Too end the year we had challenge games organised for the group where we played against Armagh, Sligo and Monaghan.

Credit must go to the players, volunteer mentors David Woods and Martin Morgan and staff member Anthony Courtney for their hard work over the season were there has been considerable progress made. Thank you also to the parents/guardians for the efforts put in and for their support for any fundraisers held during the year.

U15 Hurling Academy Squad

Our under-15 academy hurling squad made good progress this year despite working off just two clubs at this level. Over the course of the season the team played competitive fixtures against Mayo, Longford, Leitrim, Cavan and Fermanagh with the highlight of the season being a brilliant comeback win against Mayo in Darver when the team rallied from an eight-point deficit. The team trained from February all the way through to September with their season concluding with a four-team blitz in Breffni Park.

The players were also introduced to Strength & Conditioning for the first time through gym sessions in Darver. Special thanks to Ronan Mulholland, Ronan O'Gorman, Ricky McKeown and Anthony Reynolds for their assistance with the squad throughout the season.

U15 Football Squad

From the beginning of the year our Louth U15 squad have progressed very well under the guidance of Ger Malone, Paul Crewe, Peter Duffy, Brendan Tuite and Sean Smith. Throughout the year we have engaged in games against Down, Roscommon, Antrim, Clare and Westmeath, all of which have been competitive and beneficial towards the lad's development.

Training sessions have been a constant throughout the year taking place once or twice a week, apart from the occasional weeks break where there were clashes with club activity.

The quality of coaching and deliverance of sessions, which has been based around both developing skills and tactical knowledge, has been reflected by the lad's development as the year has progressed.

At this current time the team has just recently completed their Fitness Testing over the Halloween break which saw all players improve on their previous scores around strength, power, speed and endurance. This is another indication of the benefit of the work that is being done within the squad to help improve these players with the hope of breaking through into the older and senior county squads.

The first initial phase of trialling has just come to an end, with some potential players been given an opportunity to come in and train with the squad with the hope of impressing as some changes to the squad will be made before the new U16 season begins. Feedback forms have been filled out by all players with an insight into seeing what players believe to be their strengths, weaknesses and what their areas for improvement may be so to further dial in and focus on the development of the team. Individual meetings have also taken place with both player and parent so to give them further insight as to what areas they are exceeding in and what areas may need focusing on for further development so that even if the player is released from the squad, he knows the door is not always closed and has an idea of what areas need improved on.



U16 Football Squad

This year's Louth U16 season commenced in mid-January with several players called in to the squad on a 6-week trial period. We also organised challenge matches against Armagh in February followed by another challenge with Down in Burren. This provided plenty of opportunities for players to claim a spot on the panel. The management of Oliver Ginty, Ronan Greene and Brian Og Corr also took the opportunity this season to have one on one meetings with players and their parents as a goal setting exercise which proved very beneficial.

This year the group competed in the Gerry Reilly competition and was drawn in a group alongside Antrim, Cavan and Fermanagh. First up was Antrim in Dunsilly which was played in tricky conditions despite this Louth ran out 4 point, next up was Fermanagh in Darver again Louth proved too string running out 4-16-to-7-point winners. Our final group game came against Cavan, as expected this to be a much more difficult task and despite putting a solid performance the cession of 3 poor goals made an all-ready difficult task even more challenging with Cavan running out 1-point winners. Despite the defeat the team still qualified for the semifinal stage of the competition where Kildare proved to be the challengers. On the day the group did not perform anywhere near their potential and Kildare ran out comfortable winners. The teams final game came against Meath in the shield Final played in Oldcastle, again despite a much-improved performance from the Kildare game, Meath ran out 3-point winners bringing an end to the season.

Although a very enjoyable year the management did find it challenging with so many players involved with the minor squad and no doubt integrating them players back into the fold was a challenge, however despite the disappointing end to the year there is great potential in this group and I look forward to seeing the, develop further as minor footballers next year.

U17 Hurling Academy Squad

2024 represented a momentous year for Louth underage hurling with our under-17 squad achieving a breakthrough by becoming the first Louth team to win the Celtic Challenge, defeating Monaghan in the showpiece event with a brilliant display of hurling.

Our season began in earnest in January having been accepted into the Ulster League which played a huge role in developing the team. An initial defeat to Tyrone was followed by four victories over Cavan, Fermanagh, Monaghan and Armagh, with our campaign ending with defeat in Donegal.

Our Celtic Challenge group campaign saw the team come away with victories over Cavan, Longford, Monaghan and Leitrim. With our sole defeat coming against Fermanagh the team had already done enough to qualify for the final against Monaghan where Louth swept to victory on a scoreline of 1-18 to 3-8.

Academy Squad Athletic Development Summary 2024

Louth U14:

Introduction to Athletic Development took place in April and they had a 6-week training block over the Summer holidays. The focus of the training block is to introduce players to functional movements. We have four main movements patterns we focus on squat, hinge, push & pull plus our plyometric progressions. Alongside the athletic development session, we had nutrition lectures with Aine Breen. Fitness testing for all squads takes place during the Halloween & Easter Mid Term. The players will progress to U15s in January and in the early part of the season the players will complete 2 conditioning and 2 gym session a week so it's important we lay a good foundation at 14s. For the reminder of the year, they will have 1-2 exposures a week in the gym pending club competitions.

Louth U15 & U16:

The U15s & 16s started in January and carried out 2 athletic development sessions and 2 pitch sessions every week. During the gym sessions we focused on building upon what we started at U14s. We will progress our main movement patterns accordingly mainly by increasing load to specific exercise and introducing more unilateral work. During the Summer holidays we ran a high-performance camp for 6 weeks. This consisted of athletic development sessions, nutrition modules with Aine Breen and pitch sessions with Gavin Devlin. We took a break when school returned in September as there was lot of demands placed on the players. Athletic development session will start back in October. During testing over the Halloween midterm some of the leading U15 scores were 20.1 for the yoyo, 3.00 sec for 20m & 42.5cm for counter movement jump and for the U16s some of the leading score were 19.6 for the yoyo, 2.92 sec for the 20m & 39.3cm for counter movement jump. The 16s will progress to U17s in January and their training volume will increase so between now and January it's important we best prepare the players for the increase in volume.

Over the last few months along with Gavin Devlin we have developed a coaching curriculum that the coaches within the academy can follow in the new year. Alongside this we are hoping to rebrand and relaunch the academy squads.

DKIT Report

DkIT kicked off the year in January, with all teams preparing for the championship that began the week of January 15th. The hurling team, managed by Brian Brady, faced tough competition in their group and unfortunately did not make it out.

Our men's Gaelic teams, managed by Shane Lennon and Eamonn McEnaney, had an impressive run. We fielded four men's teams, all of which competed at a high level and made their mark for the college. The senior team reached the Trench Cup Final against MTU Kerry but were narrowly defeated by a strong Kerry side. It was a particularly challenging day, with the semi-final played the day before, a delayed start due to pitch conditions, and the uncertainty about whether the final would go ahead. Despite these setbacks, the team displayed great resilience.

Both Freshers' teams also had strong performances, with Division 2 team reaching the final, but ultimately losing to University of Limerick, and the Division 3 team finishing as runners-up to University of Ulster Jordanstown.

On the women's side, coached by Karl O'Connor, Jack McNamee, and Dalton McNamee, the team moved up a division to compete in the Lynch Cup after last year's All-Ireland victory. They made it to the semifinals in Cork, where they faced the home side, MTU Cork, who emerged victorious on the day.



Overall, it was a highly successful year with significant achievements across all teams. As we look ahead to the coming semester, we have set new targets and goals, while also bidding farewell to many of our students and management who contributed to this year's success

We hosted the Lennon Cup All-Star evening at DkIT, where 30 outstanding young men were recognized with All-Star awards for their schools and clubs, along with new DkIT shorts and socks. Thanks to our new sponsor, Ganson, we were also able to award the Player of the Tournament with a voucher for their school, club, and themselves. We are thrilled to have Ganson on board as our sponsor and deeply appreciate their generous support.

Throughout the summer we had conducted interviews for scholarship students both new and present to determine the best candidates for the scholarship opportunities. It's been a rewarding experience to meet so many talented and driven individuals. In addition, we began Interviews for a new senior coach to assist Eamonn due to Shane Lennon's departure. We interviewed several highly qualified candidates for the position, which led us to expand our search and ultimately decide to hire two successful coaches. This will allow us to better support both the Freshers and Senior teams, ensuring a more balanced workload.

The new semester has begun, and we're excited to welcome many new scholars to the college, all proudly representing their teams in our league competitions. With six teams vying for spots in the semifinals and quarterfinals over the next few weeks, the competition is sure to be interest.

Coiste na nÓg Report 2024

A Chairde,

2024 has been another great year for underage Club football in Louth. We are maintaining the number of Teams entering our competitions and this can only benefit our clubs, with hopefully greater player numbers joining Club teams and participating in our games.

Competitions

The basis of our juvenile games programme is the regular, competitive games for all ages reflected in our juvenile Master Fixture Planner. Football in 2024 was provided for U12,13,14,15,16 & 17 ages. Competitions were set out to provide football all year round for players, with the possibility of playing at different age grades if required. Coiste Na Nóg competitions began on Saturday March 2nd (week 9) with the start of U14 Leagues and will finish in December with the U16 League Finals.

Competitions Review

The beginning of the season was disrupted by periods of inclement weather, resulting in many fixtures postponed and refixed at later dates. While it is understandable that pitches were unplayable during the poor weather, unfortunately some of these fixtures were not played until the backend of the competitions which led to fixture congestion and even some match concessions, which was disappointing. U14 began on March 2nd with finals on June 3rd, over a month behind the planned schedule.

The number of walkovers and withdrawals have dropped considerably in juvenile football, with 2024 being the lowest number in the past number of years. All primary age competitions were completed with the Finals fixed as per schedule set out in the Coiste Na Nóg Fixture Planner.

However, the increasing concern is the number of postponement requests that we have had throughout the year, predominantly in the League fixtures played during the summer months. Postponement requests will have to be addressed going into 2025 as the GAA Fixture Planner is very congested without having to add juvenile re-fixtures into the plan. Our focus is on ensuring that our juvenile players have a comprehensive regular games program that keeps them engaged for as long as possible.

The U13/U15/U17 Championship competitions were run very successfully as per Coiste Na Nóg Planner. It was encouraging to see 6 different Clubs/Independent Teams winning the 6 underage Championships in 2024. Congratulations to all Championship and League winners to date.

Safeguarding training requires renewal every 3 years unless specified below.

N.B. If you do not hold a *valid safeguarding training certificate, you cannot continue in your role until you refresh your training.

The Club & individual are both responsible to ensure that appropriate training has been completed and is valid.

*Valid certificate refers to a Gaelic Games certificate issued in respect of attendance at a Child Protection in Sport (Safeguarding 1) programme or the Sport Ireland or Sport NI equivalent certificate or the certificate issued following satisfactory completion of the Gaelic Games Safeguarding 1 Online Refresher programme. All Safeguarding certificates 1,2 and 3, are valid for a maximum of three years

IMPORTANT APPENDIX 12: from the New Code of Behaviour.

Gaelic Games Associations' Adult - Child Supervision and Coaching ratios for all age groups, up to and including minor level.

The Gaelic Games adult - child supervision ratio agreement forms part of the Code of Behaviour (Underage) and applies as a minimum ratio to all Club and Camp activities up to and including the minor level grade and to Cumann na mBunscol Gaelic Games activities.

Ratios

- Playing and training activities must abide by a minimum ratio of 2 adults to 10 children, (2:10). This ratio level requires at least one qualified coach and at least one other responsible adult to be present at all times
- Ratios of 2:10 apply to each group of ten children or up to ten children in a group.
- Groups of 10-20 children must have a minimum of 3 adults present at all times.
- Any group that exceeds 20 in number must abide by the minimum ratios as per above.
- The number of coaches and or responsible adults required, will depend on the number of children attending a training session, a camp or game, with consideration also given to the nature of the activity as required and the needs of the children.

Coach.

- Coaches, as a minimum, must have achieved a Foundation level coaching qualification, must be satisfactorily vetted and have attended relevant Child Safeguarding Training.
- Club and Camp Coaches must be in membership of one of the Gaelic Games Associations.
- Coaches must be at least 18 yrs. of age.

Responsible adult

- The responsible adult, i.e. a person over 18 yrs of age, if not a qualified coach, shall be deemed a Supervisor of Children. He/she must also be satisfactorily vetted and must have attended relevant Child Safeguarding Training.
- Club and Camp Supervisors must be in membership of one of the Gaelic Games Associations.
- When appointing a person as a Supervisor or 'responsible adult' to work at underage level Clubs have a responsibility to appoint persons of the highest standards who shall be recognised as role models to work with children.
- Persons appointed as Supervisors of Children shall be obliged to be satisfactorily vetted and must have attended relevant Child Safeguarding Training.

Camp and Activity Assistant

- The role of Camp and Activity Assistant is that of assisting and not coaching or supervising.
- The following applies to a Camp Assistant:
- Camp/Activity Assistants must be at least 16 yrs. of age
- Must be vetted by their Association in accordance with the GNVB or AccessNI process.
- Must complete the Camp Assistant Safeguarding Training Programme or acceptable and equivalent safeguarding training programme if working at camps.

- May choose to attend additional Child Safeguarding training e.g. Safeguarding 1 workshop.
- May not act in a coaching or supervisory role, which are two other distinct roles...

Gender requirements

- Where a team or training group consists of both boys and girls, the supervision and coaching personnel, must also comprise of both male and female personnel.
- In the case of an all-female team, at least one of the adults (coach/supervisor) must be female and similarly in the case of an all-boys team, at least one of the two adults (coach/supervisor) must be male.

There is only so much one man can do and it is a battle just to maintain the status quo never mind increasing numbers or clubs. If hurling is to survive more resources are required and those at the top table are the only people that can assist in this either at County level or putting pressure on those who pull the purse strings.

Future Plans

There is consideration among the clubs to revert back to even age groups for the 2025 season. The primary factor for this consideration is to bridge the year gap that at present prevents players having completed minor competing at adult level. At the moment there is a big danger that many players will be lost with no meaningful competitive hurling available for them. The alternative is to have an u19 competition like Gaelic but I don't think we will get the players committed at that age with college etc and their focus would be more on playing at adult level. It would be good at this stage to get an indication on the plans the Minor Football Board have for their age structures going into 2025.

The role of PRO is hugely demanding, time consuming but ultimately very rewarding. The role is ever evolving and has become much bigger than one person. There is much discussion among county PROS as to having a designated assistant PRO role added to county executives, similar to that of chairperson, secretary and treasurer.

Social Media

Social media plays a massive role in the promotion of our games and other events and activities. We have many new followers on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram and due to our success on the field at intercounty level our numbers of followers have grown across all platforms. B. Ó hEarail (Tír Eoghain) suggested that it be put to the floor that any surplus money arising from hosting Rugby/Soccer games in Croke Park be ringfenced for Club development. The Ard Stiúrthóir advised that such a proposal needed to be considered by the Finance Committee and An Coiste Bainistíochta. It was put to the floor, and the majority of delegates favoured the proposal.

2024 Allianz League Accounts

G. Ó Maoilriain reported on a number of factors that potentially contributed to the Allianz Leagues gate income being down 7% on 2023. These included 2024 match pairings and the inclement weather across March and April. Overall attendances were back in line with 2022 and 2019 at 602k. He reported that the increased rate of travel grants to counties had resulted in a reduced pool distribution; the minimum distribution to a dual county for 2024 was €45k. He explained in detail how the league gate income is collected and dispersed. The 2024 Allianz League Accounts were approved

June

Detailed debate pursued during which it was noted that Féile na nGael would be hosted by Coiste Contae Loch Garman on Saturday, 22nd June; the same day as the Hurling Quarter-Final between An Clár and Loch Garman is scheduled to be played causing issues for volunteers and officers. It was noted that the teams participating in the Tailteann Cup had travel/hotel arrangements in place in advance and players had arranged personal commitments around the pre-agreed fixtures schedule. Great emphasis was placed on the promotion of hurling during the debate.

After numerous contributions were made to both sides of the argument, the Uachtarán called for a vote; he thanked the delegates for contributing to the debate.

B. Ó hÉarail (Tír Eoghain) sought clarification regarding a communication which had been circulated regarding an increase of €.5m in club grants for 2025 and a ticket price increase.

He questioned how the increase in club grants from €4.5m to €5m in 2025 could be known at this stage. He argued that the decision to allocate surplus monies arising from the hosting of rugby/soccer games in Croke Park should positively impact the club grants allocation. The Ard Stiúrthóir explained that the 2025 budget was not available as yet but that the club grant increase of €.5m for 2025 had been previously agreed in line with the strategic plan.

The Ard Stiúrthóir also confirmed that An Coiste Bainistíochta had taken the decision to increase ticket prices in December 2023, but the decision had not been publicly announced until a marketing plan was ready.

September

T. Ó Raghallaigh explained that the warmup show aimed to attract supporters into the stadium earlier and to provide them with enhanced entertainment. He compared 2024 with 2023 in terms of attendance figures from 1.15pm to 3pm which showed that supporters arrived earlier to the stadium. He noted that a suitable curtain raiser had yet to be identified. A number of members congratulated the workgroup on its achievements but reported that the quality of sound in the stands had been extremely poor

M.MacGiolla Rua (Gaillimh) congratulated Ard Mhacha on winning the All-Ireland Football Championship and M. Ó Siocháin (Corcaigh) congratulated An Clár on winning the All-Ireland Hurling Championship.

Football Review Committee Progress Report

The following members of the Football Review Committee: Séamus Ó Gabháin (Cathaoirleach), Malachy Ó Ruairc, Alec MacUilín, Colm Mac an Fhailghigh agus Eamonn MacMuiris were welcomed by the Uachtarán. S. Ó Gabháin presented a detailed report on progress to date and answered questions posed by the members; see Appendix 4 for details. The Uachtarán complimented the committee on its diligence and enthusiasm.

The Committee began the year dealing with hearings in relation to the transfer of players in accordance with Rule 6.4 T.O 2024 and the relevant bye laws.

These Hearings took place on 19th February where a total of five hearings were heard.

In summary the decision of the CCC regards two of the cases was upheld on the basis that there was no infringement or misapplication on of rule by the CCC and that the CCC afforded all parties a fair hearing and in relation on to three of the cases the committee referred to the CCC for re-processing.

As the playing season got under way in February, the first Hearings request took place in May arising from disciplinary reports, seven cases were heard in May, three in July, one in August, six in September (with one taken to Leinster), and one in October.

A total of 18 cases were heard in 2024 (with one outstanding at the me of writing). This compares to 26 in 2023 and 10 cases in 2022.

One request for a hearing was ruled out of order due to been outside the agreed time frame for submission.

The majority of the cases were held face to face, but when necessary were held on-line.

The one appeal to Leinster Council, resulted in Leinster council ruling in favor of the hearings committee citing no rules or codes were infringed or misapplied.

Disciplinary incidents included:

- Striking or attempting to strike with arm, elbow, hand or knee with minimal force.
- Abusive language towards a Referee, Umpire, Linesman or Sideline Official.
- Contributing to a melee.

All hearings were heard in accordance with T.O. 2024 16.1.

Most cases related to decisions arising from referees' reports and relied upon the provision of the Hearings Committee as to what the defendants considered compelling evidence to contradict a referee's report in accordance with Rule 16.1 (aa) (vi) extract below.

"A Referee's Report, including any Clarification thereto, shall be presumed to be correct in all factual matters and may only be rebutted where unedited video or other compelling evidence contradicts it."

The Hearings Committee adjudicated on all cases in accordance with the rules as laid down in T.O 2024 and specifically applied Rule 16.1 on decisions considering the evidence as presented in all cases:



(bb) The Hearings Committee has the final power to determine all matters of fact and all sources of evidence submitted to the Hearing shall be considered. An Infraction shall be treated as proved if, in the opinion of the Hearings Committee, the Infraction alleged is more likely to have occurred than not to have occurred.

(cc) Where the Infraction alleged is proven to the satisfaction of a Hearings Committee, the Hearings Committee shall be entitled to impose such penalties as it deems fit, subject to Rule, and with due regard, where appropriate, to Rules 7.2(b) and (c) (as these relate to 'Repeat Infraction') and/ or 7.5(b), and without being bound in any respect by the terms of the Proposed Penalty.

(dd) Subject to the Rules of Evidence above, the Hearings Committee may make a finding that the facts proven disclose an infraction but either:

- (i) One less serious than that alleged in the Notice of Disciplinary Action or
- (ii) One that differs from that alleged in the Notice of Disciplinary Action but is in the same Category of Infraction. And may make a decision accordingly.

The Hearings Committee would like to thank the players, the CCC (notably Secretary Stephen Murphy and Chairperson Sean Carroll), the referees, the County Board, the videographers, the clubs (and their officers) for their courtesy and cooperation over the past year.

In my capacity as Secretary, I wish to thank the all-committee members of the Hearings Committee, for their work, often at short notice over the past year.

My thanks too to Bernard Smith in Croke Park for his guidance throughout the year.

Safety & Facilities Officer Report 2024

Safety & Facilities Committee (Coiste Sábháilteachta & Saoráidí)

The Role of the Safety and Facilities Officer and Committee is to provide advice and support to clubs on best practice in several key areas including Ground Health & Safety, the Protection of Association Property (including title), Trusteeship, Insurances and the development of Grounds and Facilities (including funding available for these developments). If any club has any queries or issues regarding Health & Safety, Protection of Association Property, Trusteeship, Insurances or the development of Grounds and Facilities please do not hesitate to contact Colm on safetyandfacilities.louth@gaa.ie or 087 9793339.

The Safety and Facilities Officer is Colm Holmes and the current committee consists of David Hearty, Padraig Fallon, Pat Toner Bob Doheny and Aidan Berrills where collectively they are familiar with all aspects of the role.

Over the last year we have worked with Leinster council in relation to acquisition of property and grant applications where we have helped in the preparation of paperwork and applications for a number of clubs all I hope are happy with the outcome. We have also helped in carrying out safety audits for some clubs around the country.

We have been also been working hard on some grant applications for the Centre of Excellence in Darver where we are planning some major works, energy upgrades, new dressing rooms with ball wall and spectator stand. While some of these will require grant aid, we are about to move forward with energy upgrades to the entire facility.

This includes replacement of the floodlighting with LED to all 6 pitches, replacement of all light fitting in clubrooms to low energy lighting, installation of $500m^2$ of PV Panels, battery storage, upgrade of ESB supply, insulation upgrades to clubrooms and replacement of the current heating system with Heat Pumps. As you can imagine this is a huge undertaking and with the help, guidance and expertise of the committee and Francie McMullen, we plan to commence this development in the coming weeks.

Earlier this year we arranged and run a Stewarding course for all clubs in the county. We were delighted with the uptake where we trained and certified over 50 GAA stewards for the next 3 years. If there is sufficient interest, we can arrange further training to enhance our steward numbers.

As Event Controller all our inter county matches in 2024 I would like to thank all those helped in anyway over the year with these matches. Especially to our stewards who are always there for us, Mickey Rooney of Ardee St Mary's and Gemma Woods of Inniskeen Grattans who helped with our national league matches and to Brian Caffrey of St Geraldines who hosted our Minor and Senior football finals.

So, to finish off can I thank the management committee and my own club St Patricks GFC for their help during the year, the GAA community are truly a great group of people who are only willing to help once asked. Thank you also to each and every club for all their help when asked.

Louth Post-Primary Schools Report 2023/24

As always, it was another busy year for schools on the footballing front. We, as always, are extremely appreciative to all those involved for ensuring that games were played in a timely manner with good cooperation and communication between the competing schools. Thank you to every teacher who gives up their time freely to ensure all children have the opportunity to play Gaelic football in each competing school. Additionally, the school principals and boards of management deserve a mention as they permit schools to enter competitions and provide substitution cover, within their tight budgets, which allows the teachers attend the matches.

Colin Heaphey from Scoil Ui Mhuirí, Dunleer is currently in the third year in the role of chairman while Paul Gallagher from St Mary's College, Dundalk serves as secretary, his second year in the role for the group. The changes made last year in the ming and scheduling of some of the competitions has improved the cohesion with club fixtures and hopefully moving forward the consultation and collaboration with the minor board will continue.

1st Year football

You may have recalled from last year's report that a regular schedule of playing opportunities was not rolled out in 22-23 due to various mitigating factors. This year Louth Coaching & Games have put in place a number of blitz and tournament days running monthly from September to May. The format of these varies from non-competitive small-sided blitzes up to competitive 15-a-side matches against the other Louth schools as well as an invitational day when schools from across Leinster & Ulster also attend.

These 7-a-side blitzes provide a great opportunity for the new intake of pupils in each school to mingle and make friends outside the classroom environment. Addi onally, the format allows schools, depending on their numbers, ensure all those interested in playing get gametime by bringing several teams. The 15-a-side tournaments then prepares the lads for the full-size game format played at a more competitive level.

Moore Cup & Shield (2nd year competition)

The Moore competitions took place between February & April with 7 teams competing in the cup and 5 in the shield. Some schools had teams competing in both tournaments. Each team played 4 group games before the knock-out stages.

Flood Cup & Shield (Under-16.5)

The Flood competitions took place between November & February with 8 teams taking part in the cup and 5 in the shield. The Cup consisted of two groups of 4 with the top team in each group progressing to semi while second and third in each group played off in quarter finals. The shield was played in a round robin format of 4 games each with the top two teams progressing straight to the final.

Lennon Cup & Shield (Under-19)

This year's Lennon cup competition has reached the final as this report is writen. The competition runs over a longer period from September to December to allow flexibility around colliding club fixtures, Leinster competitions and schools' other events. 11 teams took part in this year's competition, starting off with three groups. At the knockout stage the competition broke into the Shield and Cup. This year DKiT has kindly commited to host the event on Wednesday 11th December. The cup final is between reigning champions Ardee Community School who take on De la Salle Dundalk at 7pm preceded by the meeting of Colaiste Rís and their neighbours The Marist at 5pm.



In addition to competing in the Louth schools' competitions many of our schools also compete in the Leinster competitions so we applied them for their efforts in their respective competitions.

We are aware that there is a motion in place to revert under-age football to U-18, U-16 & U-14 as the primary age groups. We would support this as we see many young footballers play less football in their final year of school as they are not ready to progress to adult football and another year at underage would greatly aid their development. There are always some who can make the step up but offering those late developers the opportunity to play for another year underage, especially when still at school, can only benefit everybody in the long term.

Finally we show our gratitude to the many people who assist the schools in the running of the various competitions and games; thank you to David Fedigan in helping to appoint the referees for all games; to those referees, who without, we would have no games, to the clubs who permit us to play matches on their fields, to Stephen Murphy who updates fixtures & results on the Louth GAA website, to Pierce Caherty and the Louth C & G staff for their support throughout the year and to Jason Hoey and his team in Darver, who facilitate the majority of matches and always have the pitches in top condition no mater what **ti**me of year it is. Thank you to all.

It is really evident that interest from pupils in all things Louth has continued to increase year on year around all schools in the county. The success of our senior team and the increased effort put in at minor and development squad level has increase the desire of our young sports stars to strive too be a part of the Louth footballing family and long may that continue!!

Looking back on 2024 Louth handball enjoyed a relatively active season on and off the courts in both adult and juvenile Leinster championships, and also county players participating in two very successful World Handball Championships events in Wall-Ball which ran for a full week in September at Limerick University Arena, and six weeks later during October/November the 4 wall World championships were staged in 23 venues spread over Kilkenny, Wexford, Laois, Kildare, Carlow, Wicklow and Dublin Croke Park National Handball Centre over a period of 9 days in grades ranging from u11 to over 75s, also taking into consideration that GAA Handball celebrated its Centenary year during 2024 handball season.

Leinster 4 wall championships

The Leinster 4 wall adult championships commenced in early January both Millmount Handball Club and O'Raghaillaighs club had entries in their respective grades in singles and doubles events. Millmount clubmen Charlie and John Kelly were drawn against Westmeath's John Warde and Philip Clarke in the Ruby Masters A doubles at Kells handball club and they played consistent handball on the night to take the tie on a score of 21-10, 10-21, 11-5.

Their semifinal match played at Leixlip against Johnny Brennan and Joe Hennessy from Kilkenny unfortunately ended in defeat for the Louth on the score of 21-6 21-12. In the 4 wall singles Charlie Kelly was defeated by Gerry McGrath from Kildare in two straight games 21-19, 21-19 in a very tight exciting encounter at St Brigid's handball club in Dublin, also at the same venue John Kelly endured defeat in his singles match when he was defeated by John Warde from Westmeath in a very hard-fought game 21-16, 21-12.

O'Raghallaighs clubmen Stuart Heslin and Billy Caddell had a good first round win over Eoghan Calhoun and Johnny Westlake in the Silver Masters B doubles at Leixlip handball club 21-13, 21-15. They went on to play Colin Redmond and James Stanners from Wexford in the second round at Leixlip and were defeated 21-12, 21-16. In the Silver Masters B singles Stuart Heslin had a remarkable run to lift his first Leinster singles championship title.

On route to his success, he defeated Johnny Westlake from Dublin 21-12, 21-15 at Kells, and received a walkover in the second round from Kilkenny opposition Brendan Hosey. At Ballymore Eustace Stuart defeated David Redmond from Wexford 21-14, 21-13 in the semifinal this set him up for the final against another experienced Wexford player James Stanners who he defeated 21-14, 21-18 in a very tough encounter at the Ballymore Eustace club to lift the singles championship title for Louth.

In the All-Ireland semifinal venue at Croke Park National Handball Centre Stuart put in a very courageous performance on the day and was just narrowly defeated by Joe Boyle from the O Donovan Rossa handball club in the tie breaker 21-17, 12-21,11-4.

O'Raghallaighs clubman Billy Caddell had a good first round win in the same singles event when he overcame Eoghan Calhoun 20-21, 21-15, 11-1. at Kells, unfortunately Billy had to withdraw from the championships due to injury.

60x30 Softball championships

Due to a very tight congested clar schedule the 60x30 Softball championships began directly after the conclusion of the 4 wall championships. This meant that players had no time to adapt for Softball training or arranging challenge matches.



There were only two entries from Millmount handball club who represented Louth in both singles and doubles Ruby Masters A grade. In the doubles John and Charlie Kelly put in some fine performances during their earlier rounds of the tournament and managed to reach the semifinal stages of the competition. They were drawn against tournament favorites Johnny Brennan and Joe Hennessy from Kilkenny at Ballymore Eustace, after some very good exchanges in the first game Kilkenny were the victors 21-12, in the second game the Louth men played much better with some very good exchanges of play but could not find the form to overcome the experienced Kilkenny pair and lost the second game 21-14.

Wall Ball Championships

There were three county entries for the wall ball championships from the O'Raghaillaighs club. In the 40s plus singles grade Billy Caddell had a relatively good run to reach the finals with some good outstanding performances. Billy was up against David Stanners from Wexford in a very tough encounter which produced some excellent passages of play from both players throughout the match, but it was to be the Wexford's man's day after a hard-earned victory. Surprisingly in the 60's singles grade Oliver Mc Guire managed to reach the final and he could not find his form needed to upset his opponent who ran out worthy winner on the day. In the senior singles Ben Devlin could not overcome the determined challenge from young upcoming Kilkenny man Kyle Jordan.

Juvenile Cumann na mbunscol + 4 was Irish Nationals

What an incredible year for young Millmount clubman Lorean Matthews. In early January Lorean represented St Mary's primary school Drogheda in the provincial 4 wall Cumann na Mbunscol at Croke Park National Handball Centre, and in doing so he entered the history book as being the first pupil to represent his school for Handball. The tournament was on a round robin basis consisting of three matches. Throughout the tournament Lorean played fairly good consistent handball over his three matches and just narrowly missed out on qualifying for the National Cumann na mbunscol finals by two aces. Remarkably two days later Lorean was back in action at the same venue Croke Park for the 4 wall Irish Nationals in the under 11's doubles event with M Finnegan from the Kingscourt Handball club, after a series of very successful competitive matches throughout the tournament both players were presented with their medals from GAA Handball President Conor Mc Donnell.

Juvenile 4 wall B championship

During the month of April Millmounts Lorean Matthews was the only county representative in the under 12's Leinster juvenile B singles championships held in Leixlip handball club in Kildare. The tournament was on a round robin basis in which each player having to contest six very competitive handball singles matches throughout the day. After his six matches were played Lorean managed to win 4 games to finish joint third in the group of seven players. The standard and performances from all the juveniles on the day was quite remarkable and in particular for the young Louth representative who can build on the experience gained from a tough enjoyable competition.

Juvenile Leinster Wall-Ball championships

In early July the Leinster juvenile Wall-Ball singles championships commenced. Two Louth representatives from the Millmount handball club entered the competition. In the under 13ths singles Jamie Heading on his County debut travelled to the Ballacolla club in County Laois and was up against some very talented players from Leinster and on the day after two great wins he could not manage to defeat his Kilkenny opponent in the semifinal. Young Lorean Matthews had a relatively good run in the under 12's singles held at St Mary's school in Drogheda after defeating opposition from Kildare and Meath in earlier rounds he was eventually defeated by the number 1 seed James O Brien from Wexford in the semi final.



Juvenile interprovincial Team of 6 Centenary Tournament

Croke Park National Handball Centre was the venue for the juvenile interprovincial Centenary team of six doubles Tournament. Louth's Lorean Matthews was selected to represent Leinster along with Noah Comisky from Kildare in the under 12's doubles. During a very long day of very tough competitive handball matches against Munster and ulster opposition both Lorcan and Noah were undefeated in the event in which they amazingly contributed to a marvelous victory for Leinster team on aggregate scores to win the juvenile interprovincial Centenary Tournament.

The world Wall-Ball championships

Limerick University Arena was the venue for the world Wall-Ball championships in August. Lorean Matthews from Millmount handball club teamed up with Lorean O Graidaigh from the Michael Breachnach handball club in Galway to play in the under 11's doubles event.

Both players enjoyed a magnificent tournament playing consistently during their series of five matches which successfully saw them top the group. Both players were awarded their medals from GAA Handball President Conor Mc Donnell.

Four wall World championships

Six weeks on from the World Wall-Ball championships the eagerly awaited 4 wall championships began on the 26th of October until Sunday 3rd of November. Over the course of the championships 23 handball courts were used throughout Leinster venues Kilkenny 8, Wexford 4, Offaly 1, Wicklow 1, laois 2, Carlow 3, Kildare 1, Croke Park 3. The grades ranged from u11s to Over 75s in both singles and doubles events. Continuing on from his success in the Wall-Ball world championship young Lorean Matthews was paired up with Noah Healy from Galway in the under 11's doubles at Croke Park Handball centre. Both Lorean and Noah having just met on the day formed a very successful partnership from their first match with consistent patterns of good understanding team work that continued throughout their 4 matches which earned them top spot as group winners. GAA Handball President Conor Mc Donnell presented Lorean and Noah with their medals.

Gaa Handball Ireland host two world championships During 2024 Centenary year

What an amazing year for GAA Handball during the 2024 season having successfully hosting two world Handball Championships in the Wall-Ball code which was held in Limerick University Arena in August and the 4 wall championships in 23 handball venues spread throughout Leinster. Over 900 entered the Wall-Ball championships with leading players from Ireland, France, Spain, Japan, Belgium, Italy, America, Holland, and England. Wall-Ball has become the fastest growing code internationally. The bumper entry indicates that this event really captured the imagination of the handball community around the world. In the 4 wall World championships code 1675 players entered the tournament a record for a standalone event, with grades ranging from u11 to over 75s. In all 1900 matches were played over the course of the tournament. The first World championships began 60 years ago in 1964 New York. Joey Maher of Louth, an icon of the game, represented Ireland. Three years later in 1967 he became world singles champion.

Team Ireland Manager.



TIMELINES

Symptoms can present at anytime, but typically become evident in the first 48 hours following injury.

REPEAT CONCUSSIONS

Players with a history of two or more concussions within the past year are at greater risk of further brain injury and slower recovery.

KEY MESSAGE

RECOGNISE the signs/symptoms of concussion and REMOVE a player displaying any of those signs/symptoms from the game/training session immediately.

Protection and Prosperity Louth GAA Training Centre, Darver.

It was felt that the centre of excellence in Darver was in need of a makeover and following a request from the Cathaoirleach Coiste Chontae Sean McClean, Jason Hoey and myself proceeded to identify what was required to tidy up the centre.

- A deep clean of the building was undertaken and now the building is cleaned weekly.
- The downstairs of the building was painted and we are presently in the process of painting the upstairs.

There is also the issue of the artificial pitch which is in place since the centre was opened and is in need of replacing.

It is appreciated that there are substantial costs involved with maintaining the excellent facility that we have in Darver but like any building or facility it needs constant maintenance. With the ever-increasing numbers that are using Darver on a daily basis we want a facility that we can be proud of.

Louth County Bye Laws 2024

- 1. In accordance with rule 3.11(a) T.O. 2023 the County Convention shall elect the following officers: Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Coaching Officer, Public Relations Officer, Officer for Irish Language and Culture. It shall also elect the Central and Provincial Council representatives. It shall appoint the Children's Officer and Planning and Training Officer as recommended by the outgoing Co. Committee. Chairperson and Secretary (unless specified as Committee members in Bye Laws) shall be exofficio members of all committees and sub committees with the exception of the Hearing Committee.
- 2. The Treasurer is not subject to the maximum period of office of five years as permitted by R 3.11(b) Exception (2) T.O. 2023.

County Committee (as per R 3.18 T.O. 2023) shall consist of Honorary Presidents as nominated by the Management Committee (who shall attend in a non-voting capacity) the Officers, the Central and Provincial Council Representatives (who shall be ex-officio members), one named representative from each affiliated adult club (R. 3.18 T.O. 2023) and one named representative from each of the County Primary Schools Committee and the County Post Primary Schools Committee. The County Referees' Administrator, County Safety and Facilities Officer, Chairperson of the Minor Football Committee and the County Handball Committee representative shall also be members. A named member may be represented by proxy. All others, except the Officers, Provincial / Central Council delegates and the Referees` Administrator may appoint proxies.

3. The County Committee shall appoint the following Sub Committees whose functions and responsibilities shall be in each case to be as defined in R 3.18. T.O. 2023 All members of sub-committees shall be named.

• County Management Committee

It shall consist of the Officers, Provincial Council Representatives, Central Council representative, Coiste na nÓg Chairperson, Safety and Facilities officer and two named members of the County Committee.

• County Competitions Control Committee

It shall consist of a Chairperson, and Secretary nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee, County Public Relations Officer, Referees' Administrator (who May only vote on the appointment of Referees') One Fixtures Analyst, County Assistant Treasurer and four named representatives from the Senior, Intermediate, and Junior Football Clubs and Hurling Clubs.

• County Hearings Committee

It shall consist of a Chairperson and Secretary plus 8 other named members nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee. It is recommended that at least one of the Committee shall have legal experience.

County Finance Committee

The Management Committee shall nominate, for appointment by the County Committee, 6 named members of the Finance Committee.

• Safety and Facilities Committee.

Shall have six members including County Safety and Facilities Officer who shall be Chairperson, a Qualified Event Controller. The remaining members, nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee, should be suitably qualified in areas relevant to the terms of reference of the Committee as outlined in R. 3.20 (v) T.O. 2023.

County Coaching and Games Development Committee

It shall consist of the Coaching Officer, (who shall serve as Chairperson), County Games Development Manager (who shall serve as Secretary), Children's Officer, a named representative from the Minor Football Committee, a named representative from the Hurling Committee, the Football and Hurling Co-ordinators and a named representative from each of the Primary Schools Committee, Post Primary Schools Committee, and the County Handball Committee.



• County Cultural Committee

It shall consist of the Irish Language Officer plus three other named members.

County Public Relations/Marketing Committee.

It shall consist of the County Public Relations Officer plus four other named members nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee.

• County Youth Committee

It shall consist of the Children's Officer, a named representative of Coiste na nÓg, a named representative of Coiste Iomana plus three other named members nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee

County Referees' Administration Committee

It shall consist of the Referees Administrator plus six other named members.

• County Technology Committee

It shall consist of four named members nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee

• County Teams Management and Panels Sub Committee

This committee must meet at least twice each year and otherwise as required. The Sub-Committee shall discharge this function in the context of the Charter for County Committee/Player relationships approver by Central Council from time to time. Membership of this committee shall be detailed in the said charter.

Fixture Analysts

Two fixture analysts shall be appointed on the nomination of the Management Committee.

• County Health and Well Being Committee

It shall consist of six named members nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee.

- Planning and Training Committee shall consist of five members, the Chairperson of which shall be the County Planning and Training Officer. All members shall, upon appointment, complete the necessary training as prescribed by The National Officer Development Committee and Club and County Planning Committee.
- Audit and Risk Committee shall consist of no more than five named members including a Chairperson nominated by the Management Committee and approved by the Provincial Audit and Risk Committee and up to four members nominated by the Management Committee. The Treasurer shall not be a member.

4. Attachment to First Club

A person seeking to become a member of the association shall have an unfettered choice as to which Club he wishes to join.

5. (a) Transfers within County:

R 6.5 T.O. 2023 shall govern Transfer Application within the County.

Permanent Residence

Permanent Residence for the purposes of these Bye-Laws shall be the address at which the players/members family permanently resides. In the case of a dispute as to the permanent residence of a player/member, the County Competitions Control Committee shall require the player/member to submit such documentary evidence as is considered necessary to satisfy the bona-fides of same. In the case of a transfer this evidence must state their new address and must also be dated 3 months prior to the closing date of his transfer request, which is 15th January annually. Any party aggrieved at the decision may appeal in writing to the County Hearings Committee, within three days of the receipt of notification of the decision.



Transfers

Transfers within the County shall be dealt with in accordance with R. 6.5 (a) T.O. 2022

Applications for transfers, within the county, shall be submitted on a duly completed official

transfer application form. Applications for transfers must be submitted correctly completed and comply with Louth GAA transfer requirements as per rule 6.5, the form must be signed by the player seeking the transfer.

Players who are requesting a transfer must provide a copy of the transfer form to his present club secretary by email before the transfer deadline date.

Transfer period to apply will be 1st January – 15th January. All transfers must be lodged with the Secretary of the County Committee by 6pm on the 15th January. Forms not fully completed will be ruled out of order.

The County Competitions Control Committee (CCCC), when adjudicating and making its decision on a Transfer Application shall, in addition to the requirements of Rule 6.5:

- (a) Be cognisant of the role played by his current Club, in nurturing and developing the individual Player.
- (b) Be cognisant of the Association's Ethos as recited in Rule 6.1
- (c) Be cognisant of the potential impact of a decision to grant the application on his current Club
- (d) Be cognisant of any observations/submissions put forward by the Member in support of his application.

Juvenile Transfers;

The above Bye laws will also apply to Juvenile transfers, with an additional transfer window available in the first week of April to Juveniles who have experienced a change of permanent change, of their family address.

Exception;

An application for a transfer will be considered and granted in exceptional circumstances where a case involving a Juvenile member has come to the attention of both the County Children's officer and the GAA National Child Welfare officer at any time during the year.

The following Directive is issued by Central Council to Competitions Control Committees (under Rule 3.43(b)): If a transfer request cites child safeguarding as one of the grounds for the request, that ground should only be considered if there has been a prior complaint in relation to child safeguarding to a Children's Officer – Club, County, Provincial or National.

Where such a complaint has been made, the CCC considering the transfer request shall obtain a report of any investigation carried out by the relevant Children's Officer before considering the Transfer request. If there has been no complaint or investigation, then the Transfer request should be adjudicated upon without reference to child safeguarding.

(a) Additional: There shall be an additional transfer window for the underage players (up to and including the U18 grade) where after the above closing date (1st to 15th January), the family of an underage player moves residence permanently from one geographical area into another in such cases the onus of proof of the new residence shall be on the applicant for transfer. In the case of the underage players their permanent residence shall be taken to be their permanent address of their parent(s) guardian(s). This additional transfer window shall be from 1st April to 15th April inclusive.

(b) Re-grading:

The CCC shall process and make recommendations/decisions on applications for grading and regrading of clubs and players annually before the February County Committee meeting in accordance with the Championship Regulations. Appeals against decisions of the CCC under the Bye Law shall be governed by rule 6.20 (b) T.O. 2022. There shall be a second re-grading window for players. This special regrading time window shall apply from 14th May to 20th May.

(c) Approvals

A player from a separate affiliated Football Club may be permitted to play Hurling with a dual club (Football & Hurling) within the County provided that the same is approved by the County Committee. The player must apply to the County Committee on the Official form and this form must be signed by the Secretary of each club. In the event of the Club Secretary not signing the form, the County Committee shall consider the application and make a decision. Applications must be submitted in the period 1st to 15th January inclusive and shall be referred to the Competitions Control Committee for consideration and recommendation, in the first instance.



6. In accordance with R3.19 (I)T.O. 2022 the County Committee shall appoint the following subcommittees whose membership, powers and functions shall be as outlined in these Bye Laws. All members of sub-committees shall be named.

Coiste na nÓg

(a) It shall consist of a Chairperson, two Vice Chairpersons (North and South), Secretary,

Assistant Secretary nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee, County Treasurer, PRO, and one named representative from each affiliated Minor or Youth Football Club, Primary Schools Committee, Post Primary Schools Committee and the Children's Officer.

- (b) It shall organise Minor and Youth Club Football Competitions within the County.
- (c) It shall operate in accordance with rule 3.19 T.O. 2022 and under regulations approved by the County Committee. It shall have a Competitions Control Committee nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee, consisting of a Chairperson, Secretary and three other named members.

Hearings where prescribed and requested, and all appeals shall be heard by the County Hearings Committee.

Primary Schools Committee

It shall consist of a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, PRO, County Committee Representative, a Hurling Officer, a Camogie Officer and ten other named members, nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee, the County Development officer, the delegates to the Leinster Council and Central Council Primary Schools Committees It shall organise Primary School GAA competitions within the county. It shall have a Competitions Control Committee consisting of a Chairperson, Secretary and 3 other named members nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee. Hearings, where prescribed and requested and appeals shall be heard by the County Hearing Committee.

Post Primary Schools Committee

It shall consist of a named representative from each of the Post Primary schools. A Chairperson, Secretary and delegate to Leinster Schools Committee shall be appointed from among the representatives. It shall organise Post Primary School GAA competitions within the county. It shall have a Competitions Control Committee consisting of a Chairperson, Secretary and 3 other named members nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee. Hearings, where prescribed and requested and appeals shall be heard by the County Hearing Committee.

Hurling Committee

It shall consist of a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, County Treasurer, PRO, County Committee Delegate, County Children's Officer, and one named representative from each affiliated juvenile hurling club. It shall promote hurling up to and including Minor grade. It shall have a Competitions Control Committee nominated by the Management Committee for appointment by the County Committee consisting of a Chairperson, Secretary and 3 other named members. Hearings, where prescribed and requested and appeals shall be heard by the County Hearing Committee.

Demographics Committee

It shall be responsible for monitoring the impact of population changes and advising the County on the formation of policies to deal with those changes. It shall liaise with the relevant committees within the Association and with relevant bodies outside the Association in carrying out its functions. It shall consist of at least five members to include the Demographics Officer, who shall act as Chairperson. All other members shall be suitably qualified in areas relevant to the Terms of Reference of the Committee.

County Sub-Commitees (excepting Audit and Risk Committee.) General

(T.O 2023 - 3.19)

- (i) The Chairperson of each Sub-Committee shall be selected from the Officers or Members of the County Committee or from other personnel deemed qualified by the County Committee.
- (ii) The Chairperson of each Sub-Committee shall present a Progress Report on the work of the Sub-Committee at County Committee meetings.
- (iii) All County Sub-Committees shall meet with corresponding Sub-Committees at (a)

Provincial and (b) Club levels, at least once annually, with the higher Committee being the convenor.



- (iv) The Terms of Reference of all Sub-Committees, and job specifications of all Officers shall, upon appointment, be documented and distributed.
- (v) Each Sub-Committee shall submit a written Report to County Convention, to be included on the Convention Agenda.



At a meeting in the Victoria Hotel, Cork on December 27th 1884, the first meeting of the Gaelic Athletic Association following the founding meeting in Thurles, the now famous letter from Most Rev. T.W. Croke, Archbishop of Cashel and Emly, accepting an invitation to him to become a Patron of the Association was read:

DR. CROKE'S LETTER

THE PALACE, THURLES, 18th December, 1884

My Dear Sir,

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication inviting me to become a patron of the Gaelic Athletic Association, of which you are, it appears, the Hon. Secretary. I accede to your request with the utmost pleasure

One of the most painful, let me assure you, and at the same time, one of the most frequently recurring reflections that, as an Irishman I am compelled to make in connection with the present aspect of things in the country is derived from the ugly and irritating fact that we are daily importing from England, not only her manufactured goods, which we cannot help doing since she has practically strangled our own manufacturing appliances, but together with her fashions, her accents, her vicious literature, her music, her dances and her manifold mannerisms, her games, also her pastimes, to the utter discredit of our own grand national sports and to the sore humiliation, and as I believe, of every geniune son and daughter of the old land.

Ball playing, hurling, football-kicking according to Irish rules, 'casting', leaping in various ways, wrestling, hand-grips, toe-pegging, leap-frog, rounders, tip-the-hat, and all such other exercises and amusements, amongst men and boys may now be said to be not only dead and buried, but in several localities to be entirely forgotten and unknown. And what have we got in their stead? We have got such foreign and fantastic field sports as lawn tennis, polo, cricket and the like - very excellent I believe, and health giving exercises in their ways, still not racy of the soil, but rather alien, on the contrary to it, as are, indeed for the most part, the men and women who first imported, and still-continue to patronise them.

And unfortunately, it is not our national sports alone that are held in dishonour and are dying out, but even our most suggestive national celebrations are being gradually effaced and extinguished, one after another as well. Who hears now of snap-apple night, pan-cake night, bon-fire night? They are all things of the past, too vulgar to be spoken of, except in ridicule by the degenerate dandies of the day. No doubt there is something rather pleasing to the eye in the get-up of a modern young man, who arrayed in light attire, with parti-coloured cap on and racquet in hand is making his way, with or without a companion, to the tennis ground. But for my part, I should vastly prefer to behold or to think of, the youthful athletes, whom I used to see in my early days at fair or pattern, bereft of shoes and coat, and thus prepared to play at handball, to fly over any number of horses, to throw the 'sledge' or 'winding-stones' and to test each other's mettle and actively by the trying ordeal of 'threeleaps' or a 'hop, step and jump'.

Indeed if we continue travelling for the next score years in the same direction that we have been going for some time past, condemning the sports that were practised by our fore-fathers, effacing our national features as though we were ashamed of them, and putting on, with England's stuffs and broadcloths, her masher habits and such other effeminate follies as she may recommend, we had better at once, and publicly, abjure our nationality, clap our hands for joy at the sight of the Union Jack, and place 'England's bloody red' exultantly above the green.

Deprecating, as I do, any such dire and disgraceful consumption, and seeing in your society of athletes something altogether opposed to it, I shall be happy to do all for it that I can, and authorise you now formally to place my name on the roll of patrons.

In conclusion, I earnestly hope that our national journals will not disdain in future to give suitable notice of these Irish sports and pastimes which your society means to patronise and promote, and that the masters and pupils of our Irish Colleges will not henceforth exclude from the Athletic programmes such manly exercises as I have referred to and commemorated.
